STRANGE ENGINE OF WAR IS DISCOVERED

FRENCH HAVE A GUN THAT SHOOTS A GAS CAUSING INSTANT PARALYSIS.

London, Sept. 26.—Tales of remarkable engines of war are appearing in all parts of Europe, but nothing yet has equalled reports circulated concerning new French guns which fire turpentine, a substance said to produce instantaneous and painless death for every living being within its reach. Turpentine, however, cannot be objected to on the ground that it violates humane principles of war.

English correspondents have reported that entire lines of German soldiers stood dead in their trenches as a result of turpentine fumes in engagements along the Marne. The dead Germans are reported to have maintained a standing posture and retained their rifles in their hands, so sudden and unusual was the effect of the new weapon. Instantaneous paralysis is said to have been caused by the turpentine.
