Endicott and Raimey Entered For Big Race

Interest in automobile dirt track racing will be greater this year than ever before on account of the death of Bob Burman, the absolute retirement of Louis Dismore from the limelight (his wife won't let him) and the firm refusal of Barney Oldfield to again jump into this chance-taking end of

"Bill" not swerved almost into the fence on the last turn at the upper stretch, the result might have been entirely different and probably another half-second clipped off the state record.

On this account the management has gone to considerable expense to bring these two brilliant speed marvels to North Dakota again for the big meet, and a great afternoon of sport will be the result without question, for it is now an assured fact that "Wild Bill" and auburn haired Johnny Raimey will both be on hand.

Raimey's entrance brings to mind an amusing incident that occurred to this

plucky little driver at Columbus, O., in 1911. Raimey was then a member of the original Cino team and was forced out of the race with magneto trouble. One of the Buick cars, driven by Frank Lawell, was very popular, but the driver when well up in the race, was forced out when a stone hit him in the eye. After a few minutes Raimey was induced to mount the Buick and continue the race.

Hard and skillful driving by Raimey regained him all the lost miles and he was on the ninety-seventh lap when what is known as the "driver's horror" occurred. The right front tire blew out on the turn and forced Raimey into the fence, taking down several posts before the machine overturned.

The little red headed demon climbed out from under the wreckage unharmed and through the dust managed to get to the infield unnoticed. When the ambulance arrived, Raimey could not be found and the crowd that gathered helped to lift the car, thinking he was under it. By this time he was in the grandstand assuring his wife that he was very much alive, but he was not aware that the hunt was on for what was thought to be his mangled body.

Endicott won many admirers for himself last year by his fearless and skillful driving. The thousands who attended the Fargo races well remember how he handled the Little Seal, and though it appeared on several occasions that he would plunge through the fence, he managed to whip the tail of the machine around the curves and always held to the course, making many a fast lap.

The Sweeney Special, which is owned by E. J. Sweeney, president of the Sweeney Auto school of Kansas City, Mo., will be "Wild Bill's" mount this year. The Sweeney Special is one of the fastest cars in the world and in speedway trials has registered over 100 miles an hour. It was built by Ray Harroun, chief engineer of the racing department of the Maxwell Motor Co., of Detroit, Mich., and was purchased by Mr. Sweeney for Endicott, costing many thousands of dollars. Endicott has been annexing many victories with the new car and has finished in the money division of every race in which he has started.

The feature event of the afternoon's sport will be the big fifty lap race, the longest ever staged in North Dakota on a half mile circular track. Endicott at the present time holds the world's record for this event made at Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 11, 1915. This event known as the "Half Century Grind" is one of the most grueling contests which can be raced over the small courses and will give a clear demonstration of the tremendous strain which the cars are put through. Many other special events and novelty races will be on the card and it is expected that by the time of meeting at least eight drivers will be on hand to entertain the great commonwealth of North Dakota.

ALL SEEK WEALTH WHO GET THE BEST?

A Godly Heart and a Contented Mind the Only Source of Real Gain.

Base of Man's Discontent—Text Points the Way to Lost Treasure—True Riches Found Only In God—Source of True Contentment—Man's Vital Need of Fellowship With His Creator. Church of Christ Finds True Wealth Now—Mankind Will Find It Later.

Chicago, May 28.—Pastor Russell preached a very practical sermon here today from the text, "Godliness is great gain." (1 Timothy 6: 6.) We give a synopsis:

Six thousand years ago, in Eden, man met with an irrevocable loss.

He lost fellowship with God. He lost his right to life, and came under the penalty of death, because of disobedience to his Creator. Since then, man has searched unceasingly for his lost treasure, has sought in vain for happiness, rest of mind and body. Few have known the truth concerning man's lost estate, and few have found their way back to God. Four thousand years after man's fall, our Lord Jesus came to earth to lay down the price for man's release from the death penalty. He opened the way whereby Adam and all his posterity might regain that which was lost.

Today's text draws to our attention the only true gain. The Apostle is addressing the saints of God, those who have learned of God, and who are seeking to meet the conditions for gaining the true and lasting wealth. Only this class have true contentment. There is a sort of contentment which even the worldly may possess—an apathy of the brain, a carelessness or indolence; but this is not real contentment and brings no gain; for as surely as God has given us brains, just so surely does He expect us to use them.

The contentment of our text is born of faith in God, of acceptance of His terms of salvation, of the study of His Word. Those who have learned to know Him rejoice to have found the true wisdom. (James 3:17.) They have found that the godliness and contentment which bring great gain come only from a knowledge of God and of His Word. When they learned this secret of true prosperity, they became content under all conditions. They had discovered the source of life and happiness. This does not mean that they became heedless of the needs of the future, but that they no longer took anxious thought for the morrow.

Present Conditions Prove Need of God. When Adam was created, he was satisfactory to God and to himself. But when sin entered, it disturbed the relationship between God and man; and since that time God has cast mankind off from all favor. Therefore the race was permitted to take its own course. After six thousand years we see the results. We see the world in a very deplorable condition. Over in Europe the nations that are supposed to lead the world in civilization and intelligence are fighting one another like demons. What an illustration present conditions furnish of what man will come to when God leaves him to his own devices!

This is the very lesson which God purposes that man shall learn! We must keep ourselves in the love of God—in the condition where we shall love God, and God will love us. It is because our race has failed to do this that mankind are in their present deplorable state. Surely every heart that realizes the true cause of the sorrow, sickness, crime, misery, degradation and death on all sides could not but say, "Oh, that we were restored to the image of God, where we could be Godlike, where love would dominate instead of hatred, where life and peace would prevail instead of turmoil, strife and death!"

Here the Bible comforts us with the assurance that God has a wonderful arrangement for the recovery of mankind—Restitution. (Acts 3:19-23.) The image of God, lost by the first Adam, is to be restored by the second Adam—the Lord Jesus Christ, as the King of earth and the new Father of mankind. And since Mother Eve shared in the sin which brought death, so the second Eve, the Church, will share in the regeneration which will restore man's lost estate. Knowing these things, the people of God are contented to wait for the outworking of His great Plan for human salvation.

Meantime, through the imputation of Christ's merit, the Church class are reckoned as perfect—justified through the blood of the Redeemer. Daily the Father tests them to demonstrate the depth of their loyalty to Himself and to the principles of righteousness. Daily they are growing in character—likeness to Christ, growing in godliness. Thus they have great gain; for he who is godly in character, and whose heart is contentedly resting in God's promises, is truly rich. There is the godliness with contentment which is pleasing in the Lord's sight, and which brings the only true gain.
