## The Terms of Discipleship.

The Pastor then discussed the terms of membership in the Body of Christ. The candidate must first turn away from sin and toward God. To those who have taken that step and are desirous of progressing, the Lord Jesus says, "Sit down and count the cost." The Bible never urges anybody along this line, neither does God nor the Lord Jesus Christ.

There is only one way to become a Christian—to enter into a Covenant with God. A Covenant is a positive agreement. The call of the Gospel Age is one of sacrifice—to give up everything of an earthly nature. This is the Covenant which our Lord Jesus made; it is the only kind to be made now. Whoever would be a follower of the Lord, must make the same Covenant of Sacrifice.—Psalm 59:5; Hebrews 10:7.

The Church are to be joint-heirs with Christ in His Heavenly inheritance. "If we suffer with Him we shall also reign with Him." Whoever has counted the cost and desires to become Christ's disciple, must follow our Lord's instruction: "if any man wills to be My disciple, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow Me." To deny the Lord is to give up his will to the Lord Jesus Christ; for every member of the Body of Christ must be in absolute accord with the Head.

A Great Work of Transformation.

The speaker then explained that a great work of transformation goes on after one becomes a member of the Lord's family. No slave was ever under greater bondage than is a Christian to his Master; for even the very thoughts of a Christian are to be brought into subjection to the Divine will. That will decides how he shall spend his time, what kind of clothing he shall wear, how much he shall eat, etc. "Whether ye eat or drink or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." If he is thus rightly exercised, he will receive a great blessing both in his mind and in his body. The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, will rule in his heart and life, through Christ Jesus.

In conclusion the Pastor exhorted his audience to confess the Lord and to be loyal to Him to the core. Were there any present who had not given themselves to the Lord, his advice would be that they do so; that they tell the Lord that they accept all His gracious arrangements, that they have given up their own wills and are taking up their cross to follow Him. The speaker reminded them, however, that this course will cost the crossing of their own wills and the denying of themselves even as it was with the Master.

"He that despiseth you despiseth Me." When we consider that our Lord is represented by His members in the flesh, we see that love for the brethren means love for the Lord. Therefore whoever is ashamed of the brethren or Christ is also ashamed of the Elder Brother, and thus is demonstrating that he is not fit for membership in the Kingdom.

FREE PORTS  
BUILDERS OF COMMERCECONGRESS SHOULD GIVE THEM  
PREFERENCE IN APPROPRIATIONS.

This nation is now entering upon an era of marine development. The wreckage of European commerce has drifted to our shores and the world war is making unprecedented demands for the products of farm and factory. In transportation facilities on land we lead the world but our port facilities are inadequate, and our flag is seldom seen in foreign ports. If our government would only divert the energy we have displayed in conquering the railroads to mastering the commerce of the sea, foreign bottoms would be unknown on the ocean's highways.

This article will be confined to a discussion of our ports for the products of the farm must pass over our wharfs before reaching the water. We have in this nation 51 ports, of which 41 are on the Atlantic and 10 are on the Pacific Coast. The Sixty-second Congress appropriated over \$51,000,000 for improving our Rivers and Harbors and private enterprise levies a toll of approximately \$50,000,000 annually in wharfage and charges for which no tangible service is rendered. The latter item should be lifted off the backs of the farmer of this nation and this can be done by Congress directing its appropriations to ports that are free where vessels can tie up to a wharf and discharge her cargo free of any fee or charge.

A free port is progress. It takes out the unnecessary link in the chain of transactions in commerce which has for centuries laid a heavy hand upon commerce. No movement is so heavily laden with results or will more widely and equally distribute its benefits as that of a free port and none can be more easily and effectively secured.

THE VITAL PROBLEM OF  
AGRICULTURE

There is no escaping the market problem and the highest development of agriculture will not be attained until it is solved, for a market is as necessary for the producer as land on which to grow his crop.

Governmental and educational institutions have spent \$180,000,000 in the United States during the past ten years for improving soil production and improving seeds and plants, but very little attention and less money has been given to the marketing side of agriculture.

The problem is a monumental one and one which will never be solved until it gets within the grasp of a gigantic organization where master minds can concentrate the combined experience and wisdom of the age upon it. It is a problem which the farmers, merchants, bankers, editors and statesmen must unite in solving.

The Farmers' Union stands for all there is in farming from the most scientific methods of seed selection to the most systematic and profitable plans of marketing, but does not believe in promoting one to the neglect of the other. We consider the work of farm demonstrators valuable and we ask that governmental and commercial agencies seeking to help us, continue to give us their assistance and advice, but we believe that their influence should be extended to the marketing side of our farm problems also.

We cannot hope to develop manufacturing by over-production of the factory; we cannot build up mercantile enterprises by the merchants loading their shelves with surplus goods and no more can we develop agriculture by glutting the market with a surplus of products.
