Hughes Will Maintain Ship- ment and Travel Rights.

Does Not Favor Embargo on Munition Consignments.

Columbus, Ind., Oct. 31.—Charles E. Hughes today told a spectator that he was in favor of the maintenance of every American right, "including the right to travel and the right of shipment."

Mr. Hughes spoke in the open air before a crowd that had come for miles to hear him and choked the streets around Commercial park.

Mr. Hughes, as a personal admirer, may I ask you a question? There was the usual confusion resulting from an attempt to heckle. The nominee asked the crowd for quiet so the question might proceed.

"In the event of your election," the man asked, "will you or will you not favor or oppose an embargo against the shipments of munitions from this country to Europe or the passage of a war resolution warning Americans not to travel on ships owned by nations at war?"

"I, sir," the nominee replied, "am in favor of the maintenance of every right, including the right of travel and the right of shipment. It is a very important right that we have as a neutral nation and it is very important that it this time when the great war is raging we should vindicate neutral rights and maintain the integrity of international law."

The crowd cheered Mr. Hughes and the heckler shouted, "Thank you."

CAMPAIGN ALONE

County "Insurgents" Pool Fund for Their Election.

Lee, Graham and Two Campbells Launch Together.

The "insurgents" among the Republican county candidates—the four candidates who have taken their campaigns out of the hands of the county central committee and have joined together to conduct their own campaign—opened up today. They issued a statement of their position throwing some light upon the interior workings of the county committee.

They will spend practically all of their campaign contributions, which have been pooled, for newspaper advertising. The candidates will be for the whole county ticket, the state ticket and the national ticket.

On August 26, said the four men today, "a majority of the Republican county nominees met and unanimously agreed to raise \$15,000. The candidates first year salary, or \$750, would be sufficient to donate to the county central committee. Mr. Chaney objected to the amount and on September 6, a little candidates met with the committee and raised the amount to \$1,200, or 8 per cent."

The candidates wanted a thirty-day campaign and \$1,200 would allow \$40 a day for thirty days.

This did not satisfy Mr. Chaney and on September 16 the candidates were notified that the amount had been raised to \$1,900. The candidates were notified that they would have to pay 4 per cent. Some of the candidates had not paid on October 5 and then Al Bauer an effort was made to get the Republican league to condemn the candidates. The league refused to take action. October 14, W. C. Ralston and the county committee printed folders and on inside front page condemn the candidates who were willing to pay 2 per cent but not 4 per cent. At that meeting Mr. Chaney stated that he would resign before he would accept 3 per cent from any candidate. These pamphlets were printed by Al Bauer.
