**G. O. P. C. COMMITTEE TO MAKE APPEAL**

Will Ask Congress to Expedite Legislation Affecting District of Columbia.

A. Lettwich Sinclair, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce law and legislation committee, yesterday issued a call for the committee to meet at noon tomorrow to consider an appeal to Congress for expeditious consideration of pending legislation affecting the District of Columbia.

A subcommittee, of which Charles W. Claggett is chairman, has completed a report, including an appeal, and if the subcommittee's report is adopted tomorrow, it is expected the appeal will at once be placed in the hands of Congressmen, particular attention being paid to the members of the House District Committee.

The appeal prepared by the subcommittee for submission to the law and legislation committee of the Chamber of Commerce is as follows:

"The Washington Chamber of Commerce begs leave to call attention to the large mass of important legislation affecting the District of Columbia, the seat of the government of the United States, now pending before Congress.

"For some reason unknown to the people of the District of Columbia it seems to have been impossible during the present session to secure quorums of the Committee on the District of Columbia of the House of Representatives, and as a result very few of the many important pending bills affecting the National Capital have been acted upon or even considered.

"Is it just or right that the District should be neglected in this way?"

"The people of the District without representation in Congress. They can neither initiate nor directly urge needed legislation, if members of Congress neglect their duties in the District are remediless. They have only the right of petition. In the exercise of this right the Chamber of Commerce appeals to the patriotism, pride, and sense of fairness of the members of Congress.

"The District asks for justice in the premises, not favor.

"The Chamber of Commerce appeals to you for help in the premises, and earnestly asks that you exert your influence to bring about action on the important bills affecting the District now pending before Congress, without further delay."

It is expected that as soon as the report of the subcommittee is approved the appeal will be taken to every member of the House District Committee and every effort made to get a meeting of the committee to clear the committee calendar of District business.

**PLAN CRUSADE ON AUTOISTS.**

Miss Miner was drowned Tuesday afternoon in South River, near the camp of the District Y. W. C. A. Miss Alma Arthur, of Baltimore, also being drowned in her efforts to save Mrs. Miner. Mr. and Mrs. William G. Miner, parents of Miss Miner, left Annapolis Wednesday to accompany the body of their daughter to Cincinnati.

**SPECIAL SERVICES PLANNED.**

Seventh-Day Adventists Expect to Raise Several Thousands.

Special services will be held in all the Seventh Day Adventist churches in the United States on July 27, in the interests of foreign missions, according to arrangements made by the general conference of the denomination, at its headquarters in Takoma Park. It is expected that several thousand dollars will be raised for the furtherance of the gospel in distant countries. In speaking of the plans outlined by the general conference this year, Treasurer W. T. Knox yesterday said:

"The work of giving the gospel to the heathen this year calls for an expenditure of \$20,000, which is the largest amount ever laid out for this purpose by the denomination."

Funeral services for William P. Grove, who died at Hospital No. 1 yesterday, will be held at Sergeant's chapel, 111 Seventh Street Northwest, Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interest will be private. He was eighty-one years old, and had been a resident of the District for nearly thirty years. He is survived by two sons, Harry C. and Paul P. Grove.

The True Reformers held their annual outing at Green Willow Park, Anacostia, yesterday.

**Watermelon Rates to Stand.**

In a decision handed down yesterday the Interstate Commerce Commission declined to lower the freight rate on watermelons from the South to New York City and other Northern points. The commission also declined to make the railroads bear the lightage cost from Jersey City across the river to New York markets.

**MAY PAVE PLAZA IN COLORED BLOCKS**

Suggestion Submitted to Fine Arts Commission for Decision. Asphalt to Be Laid.

Extensive street improvements are to be made throughout the District. The plans adopted by the Engineer Department call for asphalt block, sheet asphalt and macadam.

Upon the decision of the Commissioners the plaza surrounding the Columbus Memorial may be paved with varicolored blocks. The suggestion has been referred to the Fine Arts Commission for opinion.

The District will experiment with its portable asphalt plant this year, and submit its findings as to the desirability of establishing a permanent municipal-owned plant to Congress.

The following streets are to be paved: Asphalt block—Belmont Street, Thirteenth to Fourteenth, Irving Street, Eleventh to Thirteenth, and Fairmont street, Eleventh to Fourteenth Street Northwest.

Sheet asphalt and bituminous macadam: Northwest—Florida Avenue from Eighteenth to Nineteenth; Vermont Avenue from U to Florida Avenue, Twenty-ninth Street from N to Dumbarton; and B Street from Seventeenth to Virginia Avenue.

Southwest—Robinson Street from L to M, and Second Street from I to K.

Northeast—K Street from Fourth to Fifth; Eighth Street from H to K, and Thirteenth Street from North Carolina Avenue to E.

Southeast—Pennsylvania Avenue from Thirteenth to Fourteenth; E Street from Sixteenth to Seventeenth, and G Street from Pennsylvania Avenue to Fourteenth.

Florida Avenue from U to V Street Northwest will be paved with bituminous macadam on concrete base, and South Carolina Avenue Southeast from Eleventh to Thirteenth Street with bituminous macadam on stone base.

**POLICE TOO ACTIVE.**

Used Firearms Freely in Brawl with American Marines.

Col. Greene and other officers investigating the circumstances surrounding the wounding of American marines and soldiers by Panama police in a brawl on the night of July 4 are still of the opinion that the police used their firearms more freely than the situation warranted.

Col. Greene has transmitted to the War Department a preliminary report which makes it clear that the trouble was the fault of the Americans. He and other officers, together with United States Minister Dodge, will investigate further the question as to whether the use of firearms by the Panama police was justifiable.

The Americans, soldiers, marines, and civilians alike, involved in the fight, were all unarmed, while the Panama police were heavily armed.

**Funeral Arrangements Delayed.**

Arrangements for the funeral of Patrick Curry, who died at Soldiers Home yesterday morning, will not be made until his daughter in Springfield, S. Dak., has been heard from. He had been in Soldiers' Home since 1906, and for the last four years had scarcely been able to leave the hospital. He served with the First Infantry when that regiment was located in the West during the Indian uprisings.

**Assess Damages for Street.**

The findings of the jury in the case of the condemnation of land for the extension of Hobart Place, Mount Pleasant, were approved yesterday by Commissioner Rudolph. The jury brought in a verdict of \$7,000 in damages, and fixed the expenses at \$224.75. Benefits were assessed against the adjoining properties to the amount of \$1,220.
