LEAD WOMAN—
WEAR KINDLINESS IN THE EYE.
 Affability is a happy thing. Cultivate it. Try to touch your usual manner with an extra hint of graciousness, wear a kindly smile in your eyes. It will help your personality wonderfully.
 But don't overdo it. Don't confuse cordiality with gush, as so many people do. It is difficult to explain the cold type, the indifferent temperament, but you can always feel it.
 Too many of us let our moods influence our manner. Don't "take it out" on the first person you meet.
 The cold beauty may have her satellites, but it is graciousness that wins friends.
 Then there is another suggestion. Learn to say nice things. Before you know it, ill-natured remarks, which invariably rebound to the speaker's hurt, will not occur to you.
 Here again, though, I must enter a word of warning. Do not confuse compliments or nice things with flattery. Remember what the old copy book says, "politeness is to do and say the kindest thing in the kindest way."

A NOON WEDDING.
 Women guests at a noon wedding wear light dresses and hats, and the men wear frock coat costumes.
 The bridegroom wears the clergyman (he gives the money in an envelope to the best man, who gives it to the minister). He should also see the sexton of the church, if it is a church wedding.
 He pays for the bride's bouquet, the bouquets of the bridesmaids and the bouquets of the ushers.
 He sends carriages for the ushers and provides a carriage for himself and the best man.
 He also pays for a carriage for himself and wife after the ceremony.
 If the best man and groom have come from another city the groom is entitled to play the host and to pay for the expenses of both.
 This is not obligatory and is generally not permitted by the best man.
 Of course, the little souvenir given at the farewell dinners of both bride and groom are paid for by each respectively.

PORTFOLIO FOR PERIODICALS.
 A pretty and inexpensive portfolio for papers or periodicals can be made by covering two pieces of fancy cardboard with any kind of fancy cretonne or silk. The one I originated, said a clever woman, consisted wholly of materials found in the house. I covered corrugated cardboard with a piece of silk, pasted smoothly over one side of each cover. For a lining I used some silesia which was found in my piece bag. Next I used heavy embroidery silk to sew together the covering, cardboard and lining—taking long stitches and sewing over and over all along the four edges and back again. This gives a cross-stitch effect on the edge; then two holes were punched, about two inches from the end, in each cover. Into these were run several strands of the embroidery silk, which were tied into cute little bows. Leave the strands very loose, to allow space for several periodicals. In the opposite side of the cover a single hole may be punched on the middle edge for strands if one desires to tie the papers in securely.

FOR THE HOUSEWIFE
Scorches With Hot Iron.
 Cover with a paste of salt and lemon juice and lay in the sun for a day. Rinse at night. If the stain be still visible repeat the process the next day.
Oyster Stuffing for Fowl.
 Make a mixture of a large cup of

dry bread crumbs seasoned with parsley, thyme and sweet marjoram, moistened with melted butter. To this add 20 small oysters chopped fine. Stuff the breast of the fowl with this. If you prefer you may use the oysters unchopped.

Fillings for Cakes and Pies.
Cocconut Filling—Whites of two eggs, fresh grated cocconut and powdered sugar. Beat whites of eggs on a platter with a fork until stiff. Add enough powdered sugar to spread. Spread over cake and sprinkle thickly with cocconut.

Green Tomato Chow-Chow.
 Chop fine one-half bushel of green tomatoes, one-half dozen green peppers and one dozen onions. Sprinkle with a pint of salt and let stand overnight. In the morning drain, cover with good elder vinegar and cook slowly one hour; then drain and pack in jars. Take two pounds of sugar, two tablespoons of cinnamon, one tablespoon of each of cloves and pepper, one-half cupful of ground mustard and one pint of grated horseradish, with vinegar enough to mix well. When boiling hot, pour over the pickle, pack in the jars and seal tightly.

Chocolate Filling—Two and one-half squares of chocolate, one cup of powdered sugar, three tablespoons of milk, yolk of one egg, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla. Melt chocolate over hot water, add one-half the sugar and milk, add remaining sugar, add yolk of the eggs and cook in double boiler till it thickens, stirring constantly, that the mixture may be perfectly smooth. Cool slightly, flavor or spread.

Orange Filling—One-half cup of sugar, two and one-half tablespoons of flour, grated, and of half an orange, one-quarter cup orange juice, one-half teaspoonful of lemon juice, one egg slightly beaten, one teaspoonful butter. Mix ingredients in double boiler. Cook 10 minutes in double boiler, stirring constantly.

Bologna Sausage Recipe.
 One pound each of lean beef, lean veal, lean fresh pork, and fat corned (not smoked) pork; half pound of beef suet, five teaspoons of powdered sage, half an ounce of mixed parsley, cayenne and of black pepper, one-half of a grated nutmeg, half a teaspoon of ground cloves, a minced onion, and salt to taste. Grind meat and suet; season and stuff into skins or bags; tie them up, pricking each in several places to allow the steam to escape; drop into pot of hot (not boiling) water and bring slowly to the boil. Keep this up one hour; take out the skins and lay upon sweet hay or straw to dry in the boiler. Rub the skins with melted lard or butter and sprinkle pepper upon them. Hang in a cool cellar. These sausages need no cooking. When you wish to use them, wash off the pepper, wipe dry, and cut into thin slices.

DEBATERS OF THE B. Y. UNIVERSITY
 Provo, March 27.—The Brigham Young university has three debating teams in the field wrestling with the Panama canal tolls question. Resolved, That the United States should exempt all United States vessels engaged in coastwise trade, passing through the Panama canal, from toll charges; the right to exempt such vessels being conceded.
 David J. Wilson and Charles Schweske, by the team which was awarded the decision in a debate on the same question with the University of Southern California team, March 8, will meet Nevada university debaters at Reno on April 10. This time the B. Y. U. team will argue in favor of exemption. In the debate with the Californians Messrs. Schweske and Wilson had the negative. They are both active and engaged in several inter-collegiate debates.
 Saturday, March 28, in college hall, Provo, Aldous Dixon and LeRoy Hafen will maintain the affirmative with A. C. U. debaters for the negative.

GREAT PREPARATION FOR TRAVEL OF 1915
 As an example of the preparation being made by the transcontinentals to handle the heavy business of 1915 and succeeding years, the report of improvements made by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad during the past year shows that this road will have spent \$22,000,000 by July 1 in revising its Omaha-Chicago line. A report of the improvements made, received yesterday by the local office of the road, states that by the date mentioned the double track between Omaha and Chicago will be entirely completed.
 Revision of the line, according to the report has in many instances taken the road away from old townships, and in these cases the towns are being moved bodily to the new locations. Electric block signals are being installed the entire distance. One feature of the improvement is the new bridge over the Des Moines river. This is one of the largest structures of its kind in the world, is 2400 feet long and contains 6500 tons of steel.
 The improvements are virtually completed and constitute, declares the report, one of the largest pieces of railway construction carried on in recent times in this country.

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CAMBRIDGE WINS ROWING CONTEST

Annual Eight-oared Race From Putney to Mortlake on the Thames.
CREW MAKES FAST TIME
Winners Cross Line Four and a Half Lengths Ahead of Oxford.
 London, March 28.—The Cambridge university crew today won easily from Oxford in the annual eight-oared race from Putney to Mortlake on the Thames.
 The distance, 4 1/4 miles, was covered in the fast time of 20 minutes 23 seconds, Cambridge crossing the line 4 1/2 lengths in the lead.
 The Cambridge crew had been the favorite throughout the training season and justified the predictions that it would win by making the race a procession from start to finish.
 Cambridge won the toss for position and chose the Surrey side of the river, thus obtaining the advantage of shelter from a light wind.
 The oars of the Oxford crew were the first to grip the water but the longer stroke of the Light Blues immediately gave them the lead. After this there was no doubt as to the result.
 When the crews shot through Hamersmith bridge, the half-way mark, Cambridge had a lead of two lengths. This was maintained until the boats approached Barnes bridge, where the leaders spurred and took another length.

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CHRIST'S COMING WORLD'S END 1914

Not Pastor Russell's View at All—He Explains His View.
 Canadian Minister Quoted—"The Earth Abideth Forever"—Christ Will Not Come Again as a Man, According to the Bible—Pastor Russell Believes That 1914 Marks a Great Change of Dispensation—Christ's Parousia Precedes His Epiphania.

PASTOR RUSSELL
 March.—Pastor Russell, whose FREE Photo Drama of Creation is being put before the people in many large cities, everywhere arousing enthusiasm for God, fell from the Bible, preached today from the text "Thus shall also the coming [Parousia—presence] of the Son of Man be, they shall be eating, drinking, and marrying, and know not."—Matthew 24:37, 38.
 The Pastor was prompted to select his text by reading an extract from a recent sermon of a Canadian minister, who declared that 1914 would witness the Second Coming of Christ. The statement permitted the inference that the minister holds the view common to nearly all creeds—that the earth is to be burned up and the human race blotted out, and that Christ will come, to see that none of the Church are destroyed. All such expectations, the Pastor claimed, are wholly unscriptural, untrue and misleading.
 Then the Pastor explained in full the various Scriptures commonly supposed to support such views. The wrong interpretations so prevalent, he claimed, belong to the Dark Ages, when public teachers seemed to lose all appreciation of figurative language; and when Christ's references to Gehenna Fire, which burned outside the wall of Jerusalem, were understood to refer to an eternity of torture for all except the saintly few. He showed that St. Peter's words, "the heavens shall be on fire," and "the earth and the things therein shall be burned up," refer to the very period which St. Peter elsewhere calls "Times of Restitution" and blessing (not world-burning) to follow Jesus' Second Coming.
 Both the Master and His Apostles, the Pastor asserted, frequently used the word fire as symbolical of tribulation. Among the many Scriptures quoted to substantiate his assertion was St. Peter's exhortation, "Think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which shall try you."
 The Pastor quoted many Scriptures to prove that the earth is not to be destroyed; that "the earth abideth forever"; that God "created it not in vain, but formed it to be inhabited." This last prophecy, he claimed, has not yet been fulfilled; for immense tracts of land are still unoccupied.
 The speaker then discussed popular misconceptions respecting the end of the world and showed that these are based upon a misunderstanding, due to the fact that our Common Version Bible uses the word world where the word age, epoch, or order of things, would better express the thought of the original. According to Scripture, the present order, of which Satan is ruler, is to give place to a new order of things, under control of the Prince of Light.
 Christ's Second Coming.
 Next the Pastor demonstrated conclusively from Scripture that our Lord is no longer a human being. Nearly nineteen centuries ago, the Logos left Heavenly glory and was made flesh. God had pronounced a death sentence upon man, from which the race could not be released unless some one would become their redeemer and meet the penalty for them. This penalty was death, not eternal torment, of which the Scriptures know nothing. Our Lord carried out the Divine Program, and as a reward has been highly exalted—"far above angels."
 The speaker then showed that the word coming
