December was a record breaker in the number of unemployed who sought shelter at the police station, the total number who applied for lodging last month being close to 2000. The police report for the month of December shows that during the month 264 arrests were made by the police. The fire report for the month showed that during the month there were ten box alarms and ten still alarms.
