DEFALCATIONS DURING YEAR OF FOUR MILLIONS

ACCORDING TO BULLETINS ISSUED BY NATIONAL SURETY COMPANY, THE EVIL AMOUNTED TO HUGE SUMS IN 1913.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. New York, June 6.—Defalcations amounting to approximately \$4,000,000 were publicly reported in the United States in 1913, according to estimates recently obtained by the National Surety company and yesterday made public by William B. Joyce, president.

Unreported and undiscovered defalcations, though impossible to compute accurately, may be consequently estimated at \$40,000,000.

The company seeks to call attention to the widespread nature of the defalcation evil. Meagre salaries are unquestionably one of the chief causes. Clerks, managers and cashiers who have tried unsuccessfully to support large families on from \$75 to \$100 per month, form a large part of the defalcators.

Another important cause of defalcation has been the prevailing business depression. Many victimized employers who, in times of prosperity might have concealed their employer's defalcation for business or humane reasons, have been obliged to realize on the defaulter's bond because business times were hard, and thus an unusual number of defalcations have this year been made public.

That carelessness by employers and public officials in "checking up" the accounts of trusted employees has been another leading cause of last year's defalcations is clearly shown by the National Surety company's records. A bank cashier, for example, was recently found to have stolen \$10,000 in small amounts, undiscovered during ten years although his books had been periodically inspected by a government examiner.

Whenever a patron bought an exchange on a bank in another city, this bank cashier would record a smaller amount on his books and pocket the difference. If the bank examiner had during this long period taken the trouble to write to the correspondent bank to verify the cashier's reconciliation statement, this defalcation would have been nipped in the beginning.

MARIANNA HAS COSTLY BLAZE

LARGE WAREHOUSE FILLED WITH FARMING IMPLEMENTS IS DESTROYED WITH LOSS OF \$10,000.

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL. Marianna, June 6.—An early morning fire destroyed the warehouse occupied jointly by the Moore-Gammon Hardware Company and C. G. Ladd & Company on the southwest corner of the court house square in this city.

The origin of the fire is unknown, as no one had been in the house since yesterday.

It was filled with hay, grain, farming implements, wagons, wire fencing, oils, etc. The building was owned by J. M. Calhoun of this city. The loss will reach probably ten thousand dollars, with no insurance.

Dr. Perret is one of the few scientists who devote their whole time to the study of the earth's convulsions. He represents the Volcanic Research Society of Springfield, Mass., and the Volcanological Institute of Naples.

Details of an incident which befell him during his investigations make it appear that he had a very narrow escape from death on Sakurajima in March. He was taking notes of a lava flow when suddenly a small crater, only sixty feet from where he was standing, burst forth with a terrific explosion, sending his column of lava and hot rock thousands of feet into the air.

Speaking of the general situation, he continued: "We must remember that volcanic eruptions are a large number of years—centuries—we can say that volcanic phenomena is waning. Consequently earthquakes, always considered them as a whole will become fewer in Japan, rather than more numerous.

During this waning period, however, he added, it is always possible that several districts would again become active.

EARTHQUAKES IN JAPAN ARE ON THE WANE

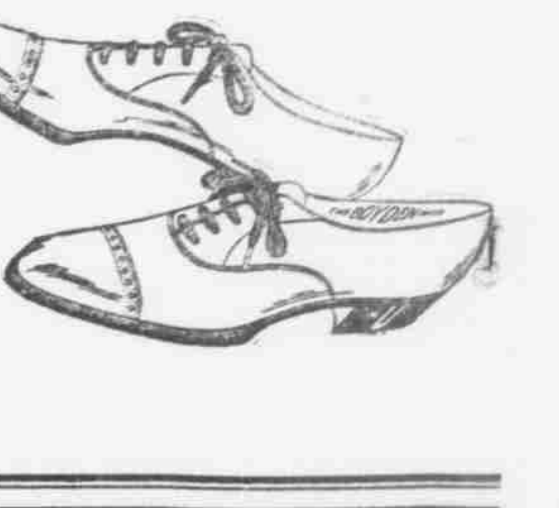
