"DEED WHICH BOUND FOR 1000 YEARS AND ALL WILL BE PERFECT"

E. D. Sexton, in Layman Lecture, Paints Picture of the Second Coming of Christ.

Binding the devil for 1000 years will be the first work of Christ upon His return to earth for the second time during the present age, declared E. D. Sexton, of Los Angeles, Wednesday evening at the Paso del Norte ballroom, when he delivered a Biblical lecture on the "Second Coming of Christ" under the auspices of the International Bible Students' association. Once the old boy is bound, the next work of Christ, Sexton says, will be the resurrection of the dead. During this 1000 years long judgment day, laymen Sexton says that the millennium will be truly realized. The man will be given a fair chance, all will be judged with truth and righteousness, the desire for drink will be removed from the drunkard, the desire to steal from the thief, the ignorance from the heathen and inanity from the idiot. In his free lecture, which is to be one of a series, to be given in El Paso under the auspices of the Bible association, Mr. Sexton said: "Many have scoffed at the thought

of our Lord's return. Just as many scoffed at the announcement of his first advent. Thoughtful Christians, however, have come to see that Jesus' second advent is just as necessary as His first advent, and that the scriptures are very positive in declaring that the master will return to earth at the close of the present age. In fact, the scriptures are so full of our Lord's second coming, that no one who professes to believe the Bible should be in darkness on this important subject. Second Coming. "Our Saviour had a twofold purpose in coming to this earth: first, to pay the penalty for Adam's sin, and second, to liberate Adam and his posterity from the bondage of sin and death. Man could not be liberated from the death bondage until the ransom price had been paid. The wages of sin is death. Jesus took Adam's place in the payment of the penalty. He died in our stead. After His resurrection to life again on the third day, He could have at once reentered the bondage of sin and death from which He had been freed. The resurrection could have commenced right there, but He did not. He had a further plan to be carried out before the liberating work should begin. Jesus, therefore, after the second advent, has His redemptive work for a future time. It will not be accomplished till His second coming. Then Adam and all his race, both the just and the unjust, will be awakened from the sleep of death and will be fully liberated from the curse. The Lamb's Wife. "God proposed that Jesus should have a bride to assist Him in the wonderful work of liberating mankind from death and the grave. He set aside this gospel age for the selection of a bride, which is to be composed of a definite number who are willing to follow the lamb whithersoever He goeth. According to the scriptures, as soon as the lamb's wife hath made herself ready, the Lord will come and take her with Him, and she will be with Him a thousand years so that she can deceive the nations no more till the thousand years be fulfilled.—Rev. 21:2. Next in order will be the resurrection. All who are in their graves at that time will be raised up, and shall come forth.—1st Cor. 15:23. What a wonderful time of rejoicing that will be! Death and hell will be abolished, and the devil shall be bound. The work of deliverance shall have begun. All will be made perfect. "During that 1000 year judgment day when Satan is bound, mankind will be reformed and brought back to perfect holiness. All will be judged in truth and righteousness. Every one will be given a fair chance. The desire for drink will be removed from the drunkard; the desire to steal from the kleptomaniac; ignorance from the heathen; insanity from the dements; and the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped. Then shall the lame man as the hart, and the dumb man as the dumb sing."—Isa. 35:5. All of this 35th chapter of Isaiah describes blessings that shall come during the judgment day, as a result of our Lord's return."

EL PASO POLICE CAPTURE LESTER

Secure Information That Enables San Diego Officers to Arrest Young Man Wanted in Miami, Ariz. Ralph Lester, wanted by the Miami Arizona, police in connection with the robbery of the Ingram store, has been arrested in San Diego. The arrest was effected through the efforts of chief I. N. Davis and the El Paso police. Following the robbery of the store a week ago last Saturday night and the detention of Lester at a former club for El Paso, the local police were notified to look out for the young man, but got information from chief Davis from sheriff Frank Hayes, of Gila county. A day later, the chief received a second telegram from sheriff Hayes telling him to look for the young man and his sweetheart at 913 Mesa avenue. Chief Davis failed to locate them there, but got information that led him to believe that they had gone to San Diego. He wired there and the arrest of the young man followed. Today he received a wire from the sheriff of Gila thinking aim for his work.
