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OTHER RESTITUTION TYPES.

2 Kings 6:18-23.—October 24. Elisha Awakens the Shunammite's Son. Punishes His Servant Gehazi.—Entraps the Syrian Army and Renders Them Good for Evil.—Important Lessons in Righteousness. The angel of Jehovah encampeth round about them that fear Him, and delivereth them.—Psalm 34:7. In today's study we note Elisha's awakening of the Shunammite's son, his punishment of his servant Gehazi with leprosy, and his entrapping of the Syrian army. While these events may not find exact counterparts in the events of the coming Kingdom, they nevertheless represent principles which will operate then—reward for right-doing, punishment for wrong-doing, and sympathetic restraint and instruction. All these principles will operate during Messiah's Kingdom, and under these the world will gradually make progress.—Isaiah 26:9.

ELISHA'S CAPTURE ATTEMPTED.

It was probably after General Naaman's death that the Syrian king warred against Israel. To his surprise his every move was checked. Thus his endeavors came to naught. He looked for a traitor in his own household, or for some explanation. Then it was told him by one of his servants, "The Prophet Elisha is in Israel and makes known to their king all thy counsels, even those of thy bed-chamber." Apparently the knowledge of Jehovah and Elisha had spread from General Naaman to the king's household. Intent upon conquest, the king sought to capture Elisha. He sent spies to find where the prophet dwelt, and located him at the little city of Dothan. Thereupon he sent a good-sized force quite sufficient to surround the city and make it impossible for Elisha to escape.

"AFTER THE WAR--WHAT?" IS LECTURER'S SUBJECT

The King of Israel inquired of the Prophet Elisha whether or not he should smite these and destroy them, or what. The answer was, "No, feed them and let them return peaceably to their own home." The king caught the spirit of the proposition, and not merely gave them bread and water, but made them a bountiful feast.—treated them royally, treated them as friends. They were set free to go to their own land, and there to tell the strange experiences that had occurred and to demonstrate to their king the impossibility of successfully fighting against the kingdom of Israel under such circumstances.

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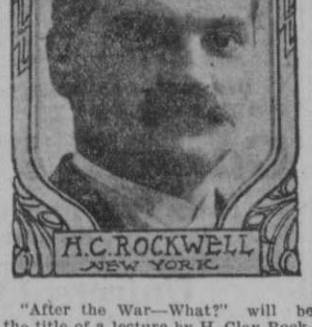
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SPECIAL MUSIC AID TO WORSHIP AT FIRST CHURCH
