ARMY MAY GO TO CUBA AGAIN

Island Republic Affairs Cause Alarm at Washington.

Washington, Jan. 17.—A third armed force from the United States may intervene to restore order in Cuba, according to a note sent to President Gomez by the state department. The note was presented to the Cuban executive by Arthur M. Beaupre, American minister to Havana.

The text of the note presented by Mr. Beaupre is as follows: "The situation in Cuba as now reported causes grave concern to the government of the United States."

"That the laws intended to safeguard free republican government shall be enforced and not defied is obviously essential to the maintenance of the law, order and stability indispensable to the status of the republic of Cuba, in the continued well bearing of which the United States has always interested and cannot escape a vital interest."

SENATOR WORKS.

Prepares Bill to Safeguard the Lives of Coal Miners.



BILL TO PROTECT MINERS.

Senator Works Prepares Measure to Lessen Loss of Life.

Washington, Jan. 17.—Senator Works of California has prepared a bill for inspection and regulation of coal mines.

Its purpose is to lessen the tremendous loss of life due to lack of safety measures. Under the bill the secretary of the interior will have authority to make such safety appliances as will protect lives and health of mine employees.

TAFT SHELVES HITCHCOCK IDEA

President Opposes Government Ownership.

Washington, Jan. 17.—It is learned on excellent authority that President Taft will not recommend government ownership of telegraph lines. It also is learned that this part of Postmaster General Hitchcock's report may never reach congress.

Mr. Taft's refusal to accept the Hitchcock recommendation as an administration policy will tend to emphasize Mr. Hitchcock's indiscretion or insubordination in making public his government ownership recommendation without having obtained the consent of the president. While the relations between the president and his postmaster general are not as cordial and intimate as they once were, Mr. Taft at least for political reasons desires to preserve harmony in his cabinet and avoid an open break with his postmaster general. It is possible in view of this desire the president may transmit Mr. Hitchcock's recommendation to congress merely for what it is worth, but with a definite understanding that it is not one of the administration measures.

If Mr. Hitchcock is turned down absolutely by the president in this matter many persons would not be surprised to see the postmaster general retire from the cabinet before the end of the Taft administration. Mr. Hitchcock's friends were positive in their statements, however, that he had no intention of withdrawing from the president's official family and that it is his sole ambition to continue his management of the postoffice department and go out of office at the end of the Taft term.

GIRL CONFESSES \$1,200 THEFT

Miss Ada Elms of Englewood Held in New York.

Englewood, N. J., Jan. 17.—A theft of \$1,200 to "entertain her girl friends" was admitted, the police of New York declare, by Miss Ada M. Elms, twenty-three years old, of Englewood. She was arrested on complaint of her employer, Joseph W. Cushman, a real estate operator, with offices at 240 West Twenty-third street, New York, where she was a stenographer and assistant bookkeeper.

Miss Elms told the authorities her father was formerly head of the Elms Piano company, that she was educated in a convent in France and had been employed by Mr. Cushman for the last five years. Since last September Miss Elms stole, Mr. Cushman alleges, not less than \$2,000.

"I did not take \$2,000," the police quote Miss Elms as saying. "I believe that an audit of the books will prove that the amount was not more than \$1,200. What did I do with the money? Spent it on my friends and myself. I liked to go to theaters and used quite a lot of money for that purpose. After I began to take money I became alarmed and tried to find some means of making it good. I gambled on horse races through a pool room, hoping I would make a big winning and clear myself. I determined if I ever got square I would not take another cent. But, instead of winning on the horses, I lost. I put up as much as \$50 to \$100 at a time, and every bit of it vanished."

FIND REVOLUTION POPULAR.

Pastor Russell Says Chinese Republic Hopes For Recognition.

Manila, Jan. 17.—The International Bible students' missions investigating committee is here. Pastor Russell was interviewed. He says thousands of Chinese are starting in the interior from Shanghai. The revolution is popular, yet in grave danger for lack of money, of which the Manchus have abundance. The revolutionists appreciated Andrew Carnegie's kind words, but hoped for a loan to help over the present crisis. They are forced to pay 40 per cent until recognized, when bonds will sell. Governmental recognition should come as quickly as good statesmanship will permit. When hope expires awful anarchy will result.

HURL BOMB AT YUAN SHIH KAI

Republic Officers Deplore Attack on Opposition Leader.

Peking, Jan. 17.—Three well dressed Chinamen who up to the present have not been identified made an attempt to assassinate Premier Yuan Shih Kai. One of the three threw a bomb at the carriage in which China's strong man was riding, but his aim was poor, and the prime minister escaped unhurt.

The bomb exploded twenty feet from the carriage, and two of the soldiers forming Yuan's escort were killed, and a score of soldiers and persons standing near by were injured. Several of the latter are expected to die. The bomb was thrown from a spot near the residence of Willard Straight, representative in China of an American financial group, and several of the wounded were treated by Dr. Garette, an American physician.

The assassins were arrested and are being closely guarded, while the lord executioner and his assistants are marching up and down in front of the house awaiting the word to perform their duty.

Dispatches from Shanghai say that Dr. Wu Ting Fang and the other republican leaders were greatly distressed at the news of the attempt on Yuan Shih Kai's life. They ridiculed the idea that republicans or republican sympathizers were in any way concerned in the affair.
