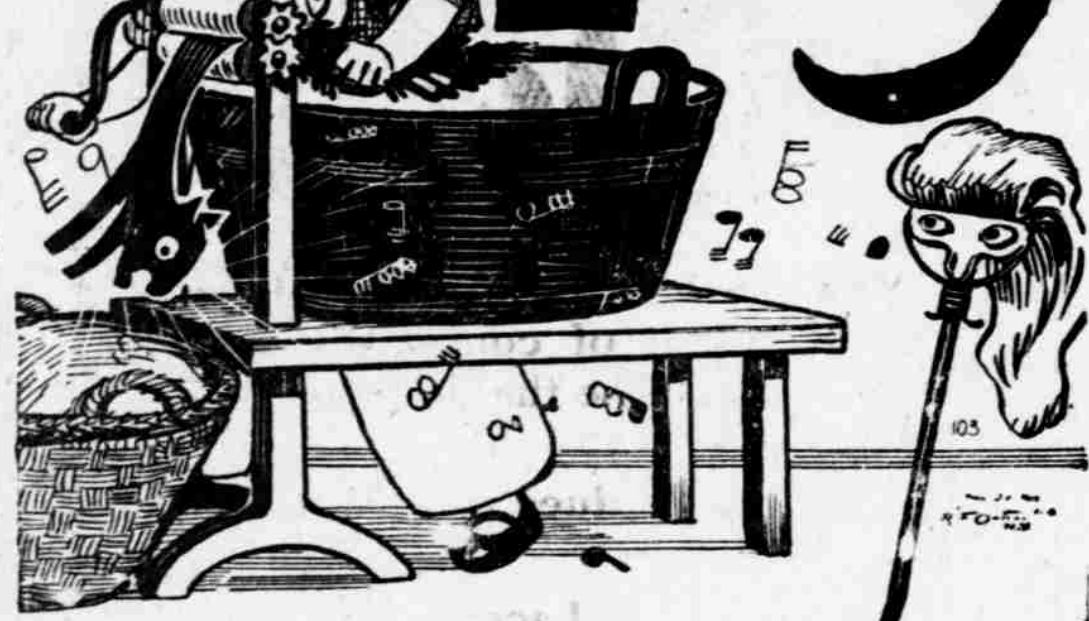

**AN APPEAL TO AUTOISTS**

Should Adopt and Strictly Adhere to a System of Signals

Editor Star: I have often thought that autoists should have a line of special signals by which our poor sidewalk performers might know just what they were going to do when they come to a street corner, and just what chance we might have of living long enough to reach the opposite curb, and a recent accident only emphasizes that necessity.

Railroad engineers have a special signal for each occasion and one can always tell by the number of toots just what that engine is doing; whether it is approaching a station, crossing a public road, calling a flagman or bridge tender, reversing and running backward, danger signal and others.

Now why can't the auto driver do something of the same kind; for instance, when approaching a cross-street and intending to keep straight on he might give one long toot; if he was going to turn to the right he might give a couple of short toots, and if to the left he might let out three, with a series of short toots to warn someone of danger or to let him get by. Then again a signal such as they use in New York or Philadelphia when the car is going to stop might save many a rear-end collision. There the man at the wheel always throws his arm out sideways, which notifies anyone following of his intention to stop.

Automobiles are now so numerous in Ocala that some system of signals are necessary to notify pedestrians when it is safe to cross the street and it occurs to us that this is a matter that should be taken up by the automobile clubs.

**COL. S. A. CUNNINGHAM**

Tribute to the Editor and Founder of the Confederate Veteran of Nashville

In common with every other division of Daughters of the Confederacy, Florida suffers an irreparable loss in the death of Col. Cunningham, founder, owner and editor of the Confederate Veteran, and in behalf of every member of the division, the state president offers our inadequate tribute to his worth, from the depths of a genuine grief.

Not merely have we lost a friend, but the work so dear to us, has lost its best friend.

God grant him eternal peace, and give him the full measure of the reward for those who are faithful to the uttermost.

Anteclating our organization by a year or more, the Confederate Veteran has always been our reliance, and never has it failed us; for nearly twenty-one years has it stood as the defender of the memories of our fathers, of the unsullied purity of their motives and their names; as the tireless searcher after true and accurate records of these great years of struggle. Its very name was an inspiration to us whose fathers were Confederate soldiers.

Courteous to friend and opponent alike, it yet never hesitated to speak the truth for the South and her children; and beside other papers invaluable to history, which it always contained month by month and year by year; it called each month for us the last roll of our heroes, as they passed into the glory of the sunlight across the mist veiled stream; and gathered up for us the record of each brave life, leaving in its files a biography of Southern men, which is priceless.

Back of all this accomplishment stood the real Confederate veteran, Mr. Cunningham; his loyal heart the inspiration of it all; his tireless brain the motive power; his great soul the life current pulsing through it all.

Quiet, unassuming, passionately devoted to the South and her history, he never faltered in the work he had set for himself; never questioned its value, or the need for it; bearing discouragement often, sometimes loss, with patience and dignity; appreciative of all kindness and encouragement; forgetful of all that was the reverse; putting his time, his money, his influence, himself, into the steady work of this great monthly history of his comrades and their deeds; there is no man who can fill the place he has left vacant, who can do for us what he has done; but still his work must go on, and every living Confederate veteran, every son of a Confederate veteran, every Daughter of the Confederacy, must feel a personal responsibility to see that it does go on successfully, as he would have it.

His last thought, his last effort for it; for the South; for us; the great messenger who brought his summons to the greatest of all reunions; the messenger whose veiled face we call Death, found him where he would have wished to be found—at his post of duty.

No failing of his powers; no laying down of his work from age or feebleness; alert to the last; passing swiftly from the thought of his comrades gone before, to their immediate presence; we strain our spirit ears to almost catch the glad welcome from those whose story he has told so truly and so well.

Many tributes will be paid to him; many monuments perchance be reared to his memory; but the grandest one of all, the one he would rather have, let us unite to give him—that one which he reared with his own hand, his own heart, the one he builded in his own lifetime, the one which must not fail—the Confederate Veteran.
