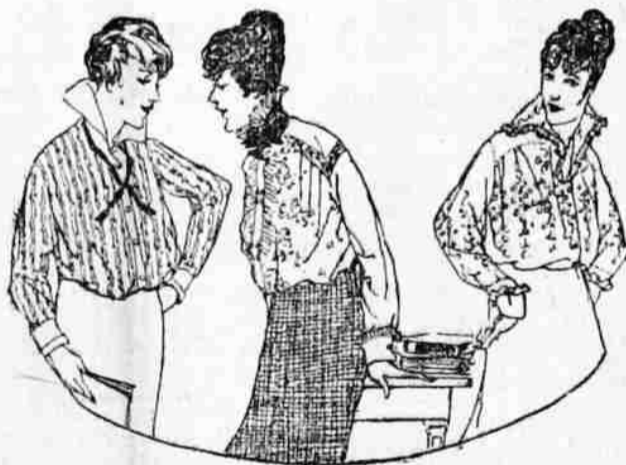

GREAT GOOD DONE BY MEN IN WORLD'S AFFAIR

Mrs. Della Daynes Hills delighted a large audience last night in the Presbyterian church. Mrs. Hills sang with a clearness, distinctness and sweetness of tone and quality of tone timbre that called forth liberal praise.

Rev. Carver said in part:

In a museum in St. Petersburg is a marble statue with its head wreathed with laurel. It was carried to Moscow by Napoleon. It is a statue of himself and we read that he took it there intending to set it up in the Russian empire when he became its ruler. He would use his genius and the lives of thousands to make himself conqueror. This incident speaks of the self-seekers who never have the loving praise of people or gratitude deep and true from lives whom they have blessed. There is in Havana a statue to Walter Reed, a young American doctor, who gave his life to discover the source of contagion in yellow fever. We northerners think but little about him but in the south he is a people's hero and his story is told as of a people's idol. He died after it was clearly shown that the mosquitoes alone carried the poison. The people, the multitude of the common people, sang "Hosanna, blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord" on that first Palm Sunday so long ago. This is the "people's benediction," and of whom do they sing it: of men like Napoleon or of men like Walter Reed; he only comes in the name of the Lord who comes to make the lives of people more blessed. Howe has done much for women in giving them the sewing machine. He has eased their days of toil and freed them from the despotism of the needle. McCormick has changed the harvest fields into fields of comparative light toil for men. Edison has freed the women from the bondage of the kerosene lamp with its odious daily need. Blessed in a sense have each of these been in giving rest to the body, but the Christ who gives rest to the heart, mind and soul is thrice blessed.

Lincoln is blessed in that he has given release to so many from slavery's bondage. The negroes sincerely praised him when he freed them and they praise him today. A. C. Dixon, in his book, tells how his father freed his 26 slaves and how four months later they came and wanted to be taken back again. They could hardly make a living and they wanted slavery and no worry. Christ not only frees from bondage but He gives power to keep free. Therefore He is thrice blessed.

The world has ever called those who have released people from pain and misery blessed. The doctor who finds a new medicine or treatment endears ages unto him. Howard made a life long fight against the debtor prisons and forced common prisons to be clean and decent. Thousands called him blessed, and you, my hearer, have the opportunity to win the people's benediction in easing another's misery and sorrow.

Let no one sneer at the little the people gave Christ on that first Palm Sunday. They gave their best even if it was only the branches of trees and spreading of garments on the dusty way. They gave the loving and sincere gratitude of their hearts and if you say that is but little you have it from another. Sincere gratitude and praise is one of the rarest gifts in the world today and no gift is better or costs more than it.

JOY RIDERS LEFT AN AUTO AND TOOK ANOTHER

An unusually complicated case of apparent "joy-riding" involving two automobiles, was brought to light this morning by the recovery of a stolen automobile at the south end of the Riverdale road, by Police Chauffeur Guy Nelson and Deputy Sheriff J. L. Hahson.

According to Officer Nelson, the police department was notified late last night by Joseph Fife of Riverdale that his automobile was stolen and to keep a lookout.

Early this morning, another report was received to the effect that a broken down car was standing at the side of the Riverdale road, at its southern terminus. The two officers made a trip to the scene and brought the car to Ogden.

The automobile belonged to John A. Alder of Salt Lake City and a telephone conversation with the Salt Lake officers brought the information that the Riverdale car had been recovered in that city. The Salt Lake officers stated they had a good line on the "joy-riders."

In the car that was brought to Ogden, several valuable auto rugs and ladies' furs and coats were found, together with a number of automobile repair tools. The rear lamp had been taken off, apparently in an effort to ascertain the trouble with the car and this was left with the tools on top of the engine.

The belief of the officers is that the joy-riders first stole an automobile in Salt Lake, drove it to where it broke down, and being unable to repair it, walked to the Fife home, took Mr. Fife's car and returned to Salt Lake City.

"HAIL HIM! HAIL HIM!" EARTH'S NEW KING

"They Knew Not the Time of Their Visitation."

Palm Sunday Portends Momentous Events—Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem—Rejected by the Nation. He Rejected the Nation—Correspondencies Between Messiah's First and Second Advents—Jewish Nation and Christendom Dealt With as Typs and Antityps—Christendom Now Undergoing Test—Weighed in the Balance.

New York City, March 28th.—Pastor Russell spoke today at the New York City Temple, W. 68d St., near Broadway. His text was, "Hosanna; Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord."—Mark 11:3.

The momentous importance of the event which Christians commemorate on Palm Sunday was not understood by the Jews at the time of our Lord's First Advent.

The Jewish Sabbath had been spent in rest at Bethany. It was the next morning, corresponding to our Sunday, that Jesus made his triumphal entry into the city of Jerusalem as the Jewish King.

The incident had been foretold by the Prophet in detail, saying, "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem; behold, thy King cometh unto thee; He is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass."—Zechariah 9:9.

The awakening of Lazarus from death had brought a large concourse of people from Jerusalem to see Jesus. They were filled with enthusiasm and, after the custom of the time, many strewed palm branches in the way, while others spread their garments.

Prophecy Must Be Fulfilled. The people shouted as the Prophet had foretold. They hailed Jesus as their long-promised King, the Messiah. On other occasions, when attempts were made to hail the Master thus, He withdrew Himself, because the Father's time was not yet due.

But now the appointed time had come, and hence, instead of hindering, He encouraged their enthusiasm. Prominent sectarian Jews were present, who, although unable to account for Jesus' raising of Lazarus, were loath to accept Him as the true Messiah; and when they heard the shouts of the multitude, they sent word requesting that He restrain them.

But instead of forbidding them, Jesus intimated that it was proper for them to do so. The Prophet had said, "Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem!" and there must be a shout.

Enroute to Jerusalem the Master halted the procession on the summit of the Mount of Olives, which overlooks the Holy City, and wept, while pronouncing His sentence. **Knew Not the Time of Their Visitation.** Apparently the nation was as unprepared as at first for the Messiah; hence the familiar words, "Behold, your House is left unto you desolate! For I say unto you, Ye shall not see Me henceforth till ye shall say, Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord!" That Day is almost here! Meantime the nation has been cast off.

If this we have before our minds the origin of Palm Sunday and what it signified, as the climax of the test of Natural Israel in respect to the acceptance of their Messiah, we are prepared to go further and to note that in God's providence there is a similar test for us Christians.

The Pastor called attention to the fact that while Israel as a nation was rejected, there was a small, faithful remnant who accepted Christ and thus became the nucleus or foundation of Spiritual Israel on the Day of Pentecost. Thus, so far as respects the Spiritual part of God's great promise to Abraham, it passed forever from the reach of the Jewish nation; but there still remains for them a glorious earthly portion, to which they will be introduced at Jesus' Second coming.

The Time of Our Visitation. Apparently very few of Spiritual Israel, until recently, noticed that it has had a history parallel to that of Natural Israel. Few indeed have seen that these two Israels have been dealt with as Type and Antitype. Small has been the number who have noticed that from the death of Jacob to the death of Jesus finds its exact parallel of 1845½ years between the death of Jesus and our day.

Few have noticed that in both Natural Israel and in Spiritual Israel there have been both a nominal and a real Israel. The nominal Jewish system was tried and all but the "Israelites indeed" failed. Likewise will be the experience of Spiritual Israel. The nominal Christian systems will be tried, and all in them will fall except the faithful spirit-begotten.

The Lord through the Prophet foretold that Messiah would be "for a stone of stumbling to both the Head and to Israel"—to Natural Israel and to Spiritual Israel. Many things indicate that we are living in a time corresponding to that Palm Sunday! Ours is Palm Sunday in the highest sense of all! How are we receiving the great blessings which betoken the parousia (presence) of the Master?
