

NEWS FROM SCANDINAVIA

Principal Events That Have Transpired in the Old Countries Within a Week or So.

NORWAY.

A new mission house has been dedicated at Vestmarken.

The tourist traffic has been satisfactory in the northern part of Norway. I. M. Olsen, of Nannestad, has celebrated his fifty-year jubilee as a public school teacher.

Both parties to the great lockout have declined to negotiate. This means a fight to the finish.

A general mission rally at Framnas, Hordanger, was attended by 600 delegates from different parts of the world.

Efforts are being made to raise an endowment fund for the university of Norway by means of private subscriptions.

The closing festival of the national temperance convention at Grinnstad was attended by 6,000 persons, and the waves of enthusiasm ran high.

A students' Christian convention at Voss was attended by almost 200 delegates, some of whom had come from Sweden, Denmark, and England.

The drought was so severe at Aremark that the people were praying for rain in the midst of the haying season. The hay crop is below one-half of an average.

A Swedish company owned a large tract of timber land at Lierne, northwest of Trondhjem, but now it has been bought back by Norwegians. The area of the tract is about 35,000 acres, but only about one-third of it is productive.

An English steamer brought the following news from Spitzbergen. A whole mountain of marble has been found in King's Bay. Klaus Andersen's expedition had lost two out of a total of six men. The lost men went out in a boat to hunt walrus, and no trace of them or the boat has been seen. It is supposed that the boat was upset by the walrus. The hunting and fishing gave but poor returns, the winter was mild throughout, and the water was open.

Beatrice Gjertsen, a Minneapolis girl of Norwegian-German extraction, who has acquired an international fame as an opera singer, writes about a recent trip to the land of her forefathers: There is something very appealing to me in Norway. It is the simplicity, the naturalness, and true heartedness of its people, the land rings true, its atmosphere is morally invigorating, one has the feeling that he wants to do the right thing, and then they are a clean people. The humblest cottage is clean and sweet. As I see more of Norway I begin to understand better the Norwegian character. What nature people must have, born under the shelter of these high mountains—how wonderful their imagination, how intensely proud and reserved, how playful and how tender their inner natures, how full of passion for the grand and noble, how patient through the years of poverty and struggle!

SWEDEN.

Many new cases of infantile paralysis are reported from the country around Boras.

The ostrich farm at Rasunda is a success. The birds are all doing well. There are eight of them, and the names of them begin with A. The names of the birds of the second generation will begin with B, those of the third with C, etc. By means of this system it will be easy to determine the age of each bird. The names of the four couples are Adam and Amanda, Anders and Anna, Albert and Alma, Arvid and Agda.

The Olympic games which will take place in Stockholm next year, will be advertised by a pamphlet of which at least 75,000 copies will be printed in different languages.

Rev. P. P. Waldenstrom is not in the habit of feeling humble. But he is actually reported to have said that he nourished this kind of sensation a few days ago. He had preached at Skovik. As soon as he entered he noticed four things that made him glad: 1, the front of the galleries was so low that all the people up there could see the preacher without a special pulpit raised half way to the skies; 2, the front barrier of the galleries was so low that the preacher could see the ushers, not merely their heads; 3, the pulpit was not so deep that only the nose of the preacher could be seen above the book-board. The book-board was so low that the upper part of the body of the preacher could be seen by the audience. 4, finally, the entrance was not in front of the preacher, so that he was not bound to see through the doorway what was going on outside at every new arrival that opened the door. At the close of the service Waldenstrom asked one of the leading men where they had secured an architect that had so much common sense. The man answered that no architect had planned the system; the parishioners had taken hints from a newspaper article written by Waldenstrom himself. This information was what made Waldenstrom feel humble for a change.

A gentleman walking on the street in Norrkoping got his jaws out of joint by yawning, and with his mouth wide open he beckoned to a policeman, who accompanied him to a surgeon. The latter had to exhaust his strength before he could put the man's jaws in their proper position again.

The railwaymen's total abstinence society has petitioned the railway department to prohibit the consumption of liquor in the passenger cars, but the answer was discouraging.

The workingmen's co-operative store in Malmberget has failed. Its sales were about \$80,000 a year.

HO! TROUBLED HEARTS!

THE MASTER SPEAKETH

Balm For Wounded Hearts, Comfort For Sorrowing Ones.

PASTOR RUSSELL'S SERMON YESTERDAY.

Aug. 13.—Pastor Russell of Brooklyn Tabernacle took for his text today the words of Jesus, "Let not your heart be troubled; ye believe in God, believe also in Me" (John xiv. 1). As usual there was a good crowd and closest attention. He said in part:—

The world does well to keep up a cheerful outward demeanor. Nevertheless, there is great force and weight to St. Paul's words to the effect that the whole creation is groaning and travailing in pain together waiting for "Messiah's Kingdom and its long promised blessings, to lift the curse of sin and death and to restore to mankind the smile of the Father's favor. Reason though they may that there is no personal God—that there is merely a blind god of nature, an evolutionary force, nevertheless, deep down in the heart, men believe that there is a God. Almost unconsciously the mind attributes to Him Wisdom, Justice and Power—but little of Love or sympathy with humanity and its frailties.

This very intuitive knowledge of God is closely associated with many human troubles. As the root of nearly every trouble, perhaps deep below the surface, is sin—disobedience to recognized principles of righteousness, and a fearful looking for of retribution, and an uncertainty as to what it will mean. This is true, not only of many Christians, but frequently true of others who have made no profession.

A World of Troubled Hearts.

This troubled heart-condition does not always show upon the surface. Sometimes the troubled heart seeks the theatre to try to forget its troubles. Sometimes its owner is immersed in sinful pleasure-seeking in endeavor to drown some haunting grief. Sometimes relief is sought through intoxicating liquors or narcotics; sometimes in suicide. One cannot surely know that the merry laugh or witty joke or cheery song do not come from a troubled heart. We are sure that they do, in many instances, for frequently those who have been indulging in merriment have committed suicide a few minutes thereafter, leaving messages that their hearts have been heavily burdened, while outwardly cheerful.

We have much sympathy with these sorrow laden hearts. As a race we are walking "through the valley of the shadow of death" day by day. On every hand we have reminders of this—grief, disappointment, headache, heartache, etc. If we are measurably free from pain ourselves, yet have sympathy, we are pained for others.

In our troubles we, sooner or later, realize the lack of human sympathy or, at least, its impotency. Feeling our helplessness we instinctively look to our Creator. In the hour of trouble remarkably few doubt the existence of God.

Losing Our Heart Troubles.

The Father knows your heart troubles. He wishes the burden to be there until you appreciate its weight—until you will be ready to cry to Him that you are sinless, weary, troubled, and above all, hungering and thirsting for righteousness and desiring reconciliation to Him—the smile of His Face. He has not waited for all of this to take place before making provision for you. He has anticipated your needs, your longings, your necessities. He has already provided the Redeemer who is mighty to save. Believe that Divine Love, as represented in the Redeemer sent of God, is exhaustless, boundless, sufficient for all your needs. If you will accept of the Divine arrangement through Christ, your heart troubles may be at an end. You will still have troubles in the flesh, weaknesses, aches and pains, but your heart will be joyful and happy in a fellowship Divine.

You need not go to any earthly priest but, as the Master said, go to the Father in secret. Go not in your own name or merit, but in the merit of the Redeemer. Go Scripturally, claiming Him as your Advocate and appealing in His Name for forgiveness provided by Divine mercy—to cover all the sins of the past and provide for all the imperfections unwillingly yours for the future, even to the end of the way. Coming thus, Jesus becomes your Priest, your Advocate. "We have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the Righteous" (1 John ii. 1). Let us "come with courage to the Throne of grace that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in every time of need" (Hebrews iv. 16).

We cannot give this message to the entire world at present, even as Jesus could not do so. These must await the inauguration of the glorious Kingdom of Messiah soon to be ushered in, when "every blind eye shall be opened and every deaf ear unstopped."

The KITCHEN CABINET

KITCHEN CONVENIENCES.

For those who have tried the card index for recipes, note books and cards of paper that are never where they were left, are things of the past.

The neat little wooden box may rest on the kitchen shelf and when a recipe is wanted can be easily found and placed near by for reference. If it is soiled by spatters, a new one will quickly replace it.

When you are on a visit, get some choice recipes added to your box, by carrying a few cards with you. You can be making a cook book every day.

If new clothes pins are put into hot water before using they will not break so easily.

To remove dirt from porcelain tubs and sinks, dampen a cloth in gasoline and rub over the places. The soil will instantly disappear, leaving the surface clean and polished.

Tips for the Housekeeper.

A tablespoonful of paraffin oil with a quart of water, boiling, allowed to cool until reasonably hot will give windows a brilliant polish.

Keep cooking utensils looking like new by boiling them in soda water. Use a teaspoonful to a pint of water.

Aluminum utensils will not bear this treatment, as soda destroys the metal. To clean aluminum that is badly stained, a solution of oxalic acid is good.

Olive oil, when it may be purchased reasonably, is an ideal frying fat, as it burns less easily than any of our frying fats.

When cutting bread very thin, dip the knife occasionally in very hot water.

Cheeses which are not eaten fresh, such as the cream cheeses, should be wrapped in a cloth wet with vinegar, kept under glass away from the light.

Sugar tongs that come in candy boxes make useful articles in the kitchen. They will remove pickles and olives from bottles, rescue a dish cloth that is under boiling water, remove eggs from the water and numerous other uses will be found for them.

While it is something of a surprise to read of the peasant cut in a boy's shirt, none the less it is here, and it is well suited to the garment. As the small diagram shows, the garment forms almost a perfect Maltese cross in outline. The only seam is under the arm, and the finish of the front represents the balance of the sewing necessary. The small patch pocket may be worn or omitted and the neck should have a band so that different styles of collar may be worn with it. Percale, madras, cambric, calico, flannel, etc., are all good materials for this garment.

The pattern (5430) is cut in sizes 4 to 10 years. Medium size requires 1 1/2 yards of 36 inch material.
