#### Rejuvenating Baths

Many women make their bath much too lengthy a function, with the result that not only the skin, but the whole system becomes enervated. The bath should be taken quickly, followed by a sponge-down or douche of cold or tepid water, and a brisk rubbing to promote circulation. For long exercise, or when one is tired, and especially for sufferers from colds, rheumatism, or neuralgia, a "mustard bath" is a wonderful tonic that is so easily prepared, also. One merely dissolves from one to two teaspoonfuls in hot water, et voila! The cold douches is not required after a mustard bath.

Two brushes for use in the bathroom are particularly good. One is the bathtub brush with bristles mounted in a convex form, adapted to the contour of the tub. The handle is long enough to enable one to scour the tub without stooping over.

The other is cleverly contrived to clean the basin of the toilet closet more thoroughly than the usual mop or cloth. The brush is round and has every stiff bristle, but its especial ingenuity consists in the spring which attaches it to the handle.

It is of stout wire, bending in any direction, and its pliability permits the brush to reach every part of the basin, even some distance down the turn of the drain. The hands need never come in contact with the wire.

A LONG-DELAYED RETORT.

To the Editor of THE EVENING JOURNAL:

The principle articles of his faith are there there is no Hell for the wicked beyond the graveyard, and that he and his "little flock" will occupy the best places in the Millennial Kingdom. There is nothing in his faith that would tend in the remotest degree to restrain him from any sin or crime. Anyone is at liberty to follow such a guide if he chooses. As for me—it is too much of a strain on credulity.

### LINCOLN DAY BANQUETS IN MANY CITIES TONIGHT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The Nation's Capitol today paid tribute to the great emancipator, Abraham Lincoln, on this, the one hundred and fifth anniversary of his birth. Tonight the speakers will be Representative Green, of Massachusetts; the Rev. James E. Churchman, of New Jersey, and the Rev. M. W. D. Norman, of this city.

A movement will be started to get Congress to make Lincoln's birthday a national holiday.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 12.—Members of the Illinois General Assembly will be guests tonight at the annual Lincoln banquet, at the State armory. President Wilson, who was urged to attend as the principal speaker, could not leave Washington. Bishop Samuel Fallows, Senator L. Y. Sherman, Archbishop Glennon and Guston Borglum, of New York, are the speakers. A pilgrimage to Lincoln's tomb was a feature of the day here.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Governor Whitman, United States Senator J. E. Wadsworth, former Ambassador Myron T. Herrick and Congressman J. Adams Bede are to be speakers at the Republican Club's Lincoln banquet at the Waldorf tonight.
