PUBLIC SCHOOLS REOPEN MONDAY

TEACHERS AND SCHOLARS FLOCKING INTO THE CITY

Imminence of September 9 Results in a Host of New Faces Being Seen Everywhere in Pendleton—Miss Viva Warren Succeeds Miss Ritner as Principal of the Hawthorne School—Teachers Meet This Afternoon With Clerk Bickers.

Monday morning the public schools of Pendleton will open for the coming year's work and from that day on Jimmy Jones, Sammy Small and others of their kind will have to forsake the swimmin' hole, the bucking calves and other pleasures of the summer time for the less attractive joys of the school room and playground. However, the path of learning will be somewhat of a new thing for Jimmy after his three months' vacation, and from the look on his face today he is willing to take a chance at it.

That the opening of school is now at hand may be readily seen from new faces that have arrived in town within the last 24 hours and by names that have been placed upon the hotel registers. Several of the teachers arrived here last evening, others are expected tonight, while the remainder of the 25 or more composing the corps will likely arrive sometime tomorrow. Prof. Wicks, of the commercial course in the high school, Miss Elizabeth Foley, also of the high school faculty, Miss Miller, new principal of the Washington school, and several others were among the arrivals last evening.

Miss Ritner Resigned.

At a meeting of the school board held last evening Miss Mary Ritner, principal of the Hawthorne school, tendered her resignation. It was accepted by the board, and Miss Viva Warren, one of the other teachers in the Hawthorne school, was elected to fill the vacancy. Who will be secured to fill Miss Warren's old position has not yet been decided, Miss Ritner, who resigned, was regarded as one of the most capable teachers in the city's schools if not in the state, and her action was regretted by the board. It is understood that she will not teach this year, or at least that she does not wish to until she has fully recovered from the injury she received to her hand while at Long Beach recently.

This afternoon a meeting of the teachers now here was held in the office of Harry Bickers, school clerk, and those who had not previously signed their contracts did so at that time.

Coming to Pendleton for School.

The Pilot Rock Record says that a number of families of that place are preparing to move to Pendleton to

send their children to the excellent public and private schools of this city. The children of these families have finished the eighth grade of the Pilot Rock public schools and will enter Pendleton high school, Pendleton academy, Pendleton Business college and St. Joseph's academy in this city.

WOMEN ARE ACTIVE

EQUAL SUFFRAGE PETITIONS ARE CIRCULATED

Active Campaign for Suffrage Amendment to Oregon Constitution Is Being Started—Amendment Was Only Lost by a Vote of 6943 in 1906—It Is Thought the State Can Be Carried in 1908—Several Petitions in Umatilla County.

With renewed vigor and enthusiasm, the advocates of equal suffrage are beginning the campaign for 1908, and petitions for an initiative vote on the equal suffrage amendment to the constitution of Oregon are now being circulated through the state. Several large petitions have been secured in Umatilla county and it is hoped to have three or four times the legal number of names on the petitions when they are ready for filing.

Last year the equal suffrage amendment received 39,925 votes in the state of Oregon and was beaten after a most active campaign against the amendment to which saloons, politicians and several powerful newspapers, including the Portland Oregonian, joined, by a vote of 6943.

This small vote against the amendment gave the equal suffrage advocates great hopes and redoubled efforts will be made this year to carry the state for the mothers.

A number of prominent suffrage speakers from the east were brought to Oregon by the association in this state and an active campaign was conducted and highly encouraging results were obtained everywhere. Every county in the state was organized and in many counties active organizations have been kept up since the election.

Umatilla was carried by the suffragists, as were several other eastern Oregon counties and great gains were made all over the state. Prominent men who had never before come out openly for equal suffrage entered the lists two years ago as active workers and in the coming campaign these men will take even greater interest because of the increased evidence from Idaho, Utah and other equal suffrage states of the wisdom of giving the mothers of the state a voice in the government under which they must live and rear her families.

It is earnestly believed that Oregon will be added to the equal suffrage states in 1908.

Two Parties This Week.

Two pleasant informal affairs were enjoyed this week, one, a dancing party on Wednesday evening, given by the Misses Sommerville at Engler's hall, in honor of their cousin, Miss Abbie Sommerville, of Edmonton, Canada, who left for her home yesterday, and the second was an informal dancing party given by Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Matlock at their home on Thursday evening. Both affairs were strictly informal.

No Fire at Spokane.

The report was started in this city today from some unknown source that Spokane was on fire and that a large part of the city had been burned. While it has been impossible to reach Spokane this afternoon by either telegraph or telephone, the Portland offices of the Western Union, which have been in communication with Spokane all day, deny the story and say that it is absolutely untrue.

Will Live in Pendleton.

Mrs. J. H. D. Gray of Astoria, mother of Charles and Will Gray, the well known grocers of this city, has moved to Pendleton to make her home permanently. She is accompanied by a younger son, Harry D. Gray who will live with her.

MILLENNIAL DAWN

DEVOTEES WHO BELIEVE CHRIST IS NOW ON EARTH

They Predict the Millennium Will Begin in 1914, Preceded by International Disturbances, and Anarchy, of Which Affairs in Russia Are a Forerunner—Interesting and Picturesque Features of Their Belief.

Every Sunday afternoon for seven years (says the Portland Telegram) a little group of people who believe that Christ is on earth and the millennium is at hand, have gathered in a room at Second and Morrison streets, where they quietly and unostentatiously worship and return thanks for the light they believe has been granted them to see what to others is dark. "Students of the Millennial Dawn" they style themselves, and in the year 1914 they believe great things will happen.

According to their belief, Christ returned on his second and permanent visit to this earth in 1874, and although he is now here, has not made himself known save to those who know him in spirit. They must accept his presence now as a matter of faith. These he is engaged in gathering to him, and the Students of the Millennial Dawn are the chosen ones.

From 1874 to 1914 is 40 years, corresponding to the period of Christ's first visit. The year 1914, they say, will also mark the 6000th anniversary of the fall of man from grace, culminating in his expulsion from the Garden of Eden.

In 1914 Christ will proclaim himself; the Millennial Dawn students believe a period of 1000 years will ensue, during which man will be on probation. Good will finally overcome and conquer evil, resulting in the uplifting of man to his original place in the eyes of God.

Between this and 1914 a great upheaval will take place among the nations of the globe. The climax will come when all institutions and governments will fall and be crushed out of existence. Anarchy will rule the land, and for awhile terrible deeds will be committed. With the proclaiming of Christ, however, these will gradually give way to an era of good, in which evil, although present, will be in the minority, and the devil will be held in subjection for 1000 years to give good the upper hand.

The students say the present uprisings and upheavals in Russia are but a part of the general order of events as prophesied in the Bible, as is the warfare against graft. New governments and institutions founded on the principle of good will take the place of those that perish by anarchy. The pastor, C. T. Russell, of Allegheny, Pa., says he prophesied that the Russian troubles would take place.

The hopes and religion of the Millennial Dawn Students are founded on passages in the Bible, where, according to their interpretation, the coming of Christ is heralded. In the scriptures, it is found that the Jews were in power for 1845 years, while, the Gentiles were promised similar time. Adding the 50 years of Christ's life before his ministry (allowing for a discrepancy of one year between the actual and reckoned times of his birth), to 1845 years, gives 1874.

The golden age of scripture and fable will follow the 1000 years of probation. The sons of men will know naught but good. During the three years, the sifting of the tares from the wheat will go on, and the followers of Christ will be separated from the others. This will not be a sudden change, however; the good and the bad will be allowed to grow together, drawing their nourishment from the same soil.

In the religion of the Millennial Dawn hell is represented to be death. Four words in the scriptures, which in the versions of today are translated as hell, mean death in the Hebrew and Greek. All persons undergo their hell only when they die, and those who are resurrected are the ones who are redeemed. In 1914 there will be a partial resurrection of those who have been the most loyal supporters of the Lord, but the resurrection of the masses will not take place till the period of 1000 years have elapsed. The religion of the Millennial Dawn is a broad one, and does not teach that only those who belong to that faith will be saved, but rather that they will be saved first and will become angels of the Lord. Hope is held out for every mortal on earth. In the final resurrection, the Jews will once more occupy their place at Jerusalem.

The services of the Millennial Dawn Students consist of song praises and prayer, testimonials and the interpretation of a text. All members are supposed to be called by the Divine Spirit.

There is no leader of the flock in Portland, but different members take turns in conducting the services. The number of those who hold the faith is small, but the students believe that "though many shall be called, few shall be chosen."
