JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER, STANDARD OIL MAGNATE, AND REPUTED TO BE WEALTHIEST MAN IN THE WORLD, ARRIVES IN DAYTONA TODAY AND WILL SPEND SOME TIME AT HOTEL CLARENDON

"WIZARD OF OIL" ATTRACTED TO THIS CITY BY FIREPROOF FEATURE OF THE CLARENDON

MAGNATE AND HIS PARTY TO
OCCUPY SUITE OF 14 ROOMS
AND REMAIN SEVERAL WEEKS

WILL PROBABLY SPEND MUCH
OF HIS TIME IN THIS VICIN-
ITY PLAYING GOLF ON THE
CLARENDON LINKS.

John Davison Rockefeller, wizard
of oil and reputed to be the wealth-
iest man in the world, arrived in
Daytona today and is a guest of
the Hotel Clarendon, where with
his party, he is occupying a suite
of 14 rooms and expects to remain
for several weeks.

Mr. Rockefeller arrived on the
5:00 o'clock train this evening and
came direct from his estate, "Pocan-
tice Hills," at Tarrytown-on-the-Hud-
son.

During previous visits to Florida,
the oil wizard has spent his time
at Bellaire, but the fireproof features
of the Hotel Clarendon, together with
the golf links prompted Mr. Rocke-
feller to sojourn here. His suite is
fitted up for the utmost privacy and
all meals are served to the party in
a private dining room. Even a
private telegraph office with a pri-
vate operator and a private wire di-
rect to his New York office are
but some of the special features in-
augurated for the comfort and con-
venience of Mr. Rockefeller. The pre-
caution has even been taken to string
a special telephone wire between
Jacksonville and Mr. Rockefeller's
office in the Hotel Clarendon, to be
used in case anything should go
wrong with the private telegraph
line.

Although in his 74th year the oil
magnate has the appearance of a man
but half his age; he is extremely
active and devotes much of his re-
creation time to golfing.

Although the coming of Mr. Rocke-
feller was unannounced several re-
cognized him on his arrival at the
railway station today.

Mr. Rockefeller was accompanied
on his arrival this evening by his
personal physician, Dr. Bigger, and
his secretary, H. D. Sims. The party
was met by the Rockefeller car
which arrived here several days ago.
Later a number of friends and rela-
tives will join Mr. Rockefeller at the
Clarendon.

The Rockefeller party left New
York yesterday afternoon at 12:38,
over the Atlantic Coast Line. It is
one of Mr. Rockefeller's inflexible
customs never to travel on Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Schofield and

Miss Henderson, of Cleveland, Ohio,
have been at the Clarendon since
February 1 as the guests of Mr.
Rockefeller.

Enormous Income of Mr. Rockefeller

How would you like to draw into
your exchequer \$2.35 every time
you took a breath for 24 hours each
day, 365 days a year?

This is what John D. Rockefeller
does. His wealth is estimated at
\$900,000,000 and his estimated annual
income is \$48,000,000, or \$4,000,000
each month. Reduced to days this
amounts to \$133,330, or \$5,555 per
hour. Each minute the income of
the magnate amounts to \$92.50.

While crossing the Halifax river
from the railway station to the Ho-
tel Clarendon his wealth increased
\$1,387.50.

But Mr. Rockefeller like all other
men, does not work all of the time.
Presuming he works eight hours
each day for 300 days of the year,
his income would amount to \$160,000
each working day, or \$20,000 each
business hour. Each minute while
he attends to business during those
eight hours of the 300 days in-
creases his wealth \$333.

The average reader does not com-
prehend in the millions and when the
enormous annual income of Mr.
Rockefeller is reduced to shorter
periods of time the figures are even
more amazing than in the aggregate.

No other man in the world con-
trols such a vast fortune. But the
benefactions of Mr. Rockefeller are
very great and there probably is no
other man of wealth that spends his
money so freely for alleviating the
miseries of mankind, and no other
who gives such vast sums for educa-
tional purposes.

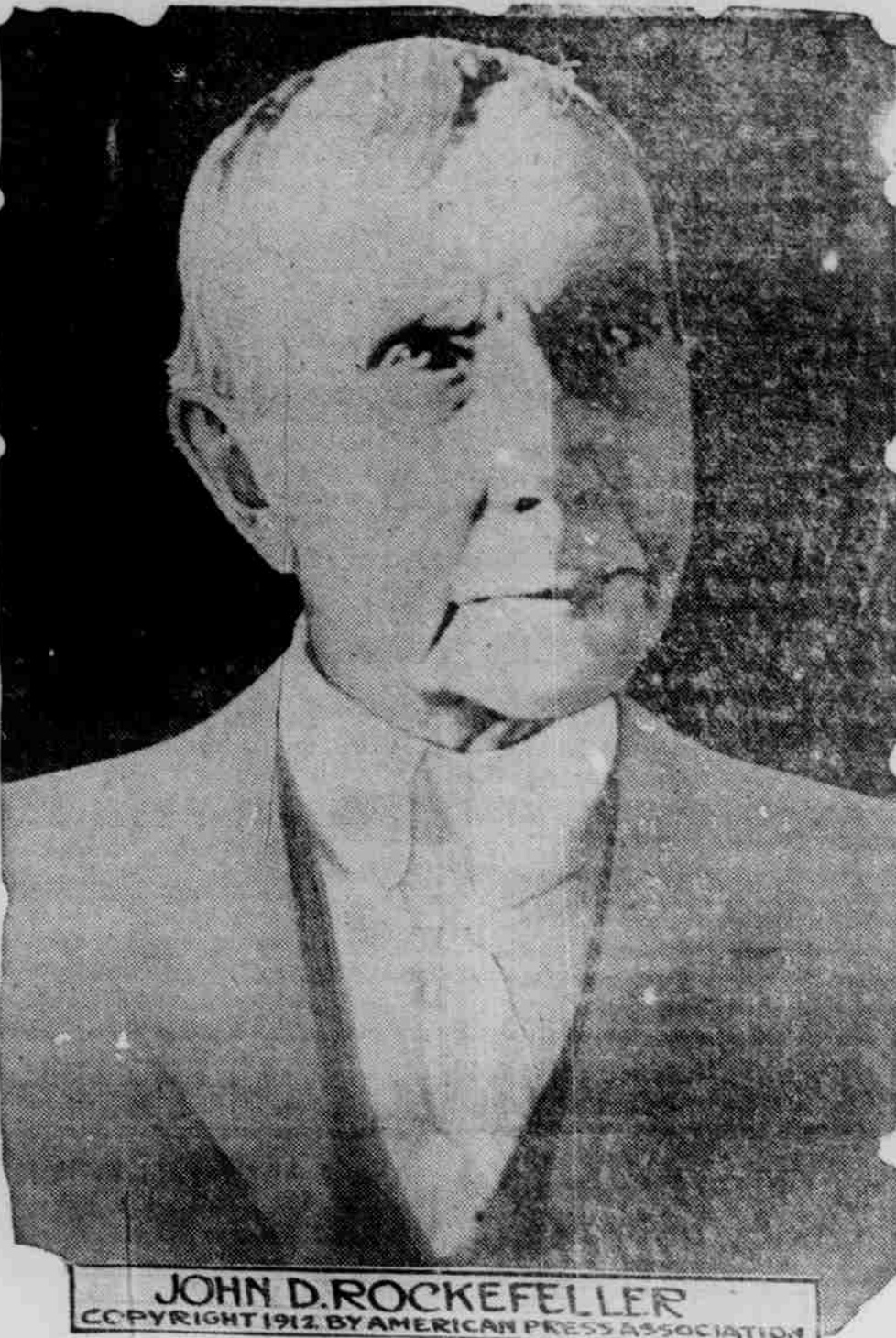
TRAFFIC OVER EAST COAST LINE TIED UP MANY HOURS BY ANOTHER SERIOUS WRECK

With several freight cars piled up
on the single track as a result of a
freight wreck near Melbourne, traffic
over the Florida East Coast railroad
was again tied up Monday afternoon
and night and this morning, and the
operation of trains both northbound
and southbound was seriously inter-
fered with as a consequence.

Conductor Len Edwards of train
No. 34, while assisting the trainmen
of the wrecked freight, was so se-
riously injured that for a time fears
were entertained that he would die
from his injuries.

HANDS OF MANY AT STATION

LECTURER PASSES THROUGH
DAYTONA ON HIS WAY TO
PANAMA AFTER SPEAKING IN
JACKSONVILLE.

Pastor Russell, the well known
bible lecturer, author and editor,
of Brooklyn, N. Y., passed through
this city yester-
day evening on
train No. 78, due
here southbound
at 5:00 o'clock.
The train was an
hour late, but a
number of Pastor Russell's friends
and admirers waited at the depot to
greet him. He alighted from the train
shook hands with those in waiting
and conversed with them during the
few moments stop which was made
at this place. Pastor Russell, whose
sermons are published in the Daily
News and Gazette-News, and form
an attractive feature for many read-
ers, lectured in Jacksonville last Sun-
day to large crowds.

Pastor Russell is enroute to the
Isthmus of Panama, where he will
lecture in the cities of Panama and
Colon. Returning to the United States
he will stop in Havana, Cuba and Ja-
maica to lecture, and will also fill
appointments in Tampa, Pensacola,
Montgomery and Key West before
returning to New York.

Pastor Russell is one of the most
prominent bible lecturers in the coun-
try. His sermons, it is estimated,
are published in 1,500 newspapers in
the United States, Canada and Great
Britain, as well as in many other
countries.

During his stay in Daytona Mr.
Bryan is the guest of F. L. Seely,
former owner and publisher of the
Atlanta Georgian, who owns a beau-
tiful winter home in Seabreeze. Mr.
Seely will entertain Mr. Bryan and
a few friends at dinner at the Clar-
endon before the lecture tonight.

The chautauqua engagement of
Mr. Bryan in Daytona originally
called for him to lecture here last
night, but the program had to be
rearranged because of wrecks on the
Florida East Coast railroad, which
prevented the orator from arriving
here in time to fill his engagement.
The subject of his talk tonight will
be "The Signs of the Times," and
because of the high position occupied
by the former candidate for the pre-
sidency in the political world much

UNITED STATES NOW STANDS READY TO SEND ARMY INTO MEXICO TO STOP THE WAR

SHIPS AND MARINES HURRIED
TO CUBA AND SOLDIERS ARE
IN CAMP ON THE FRONTIER

CONDITIONS IN COUNTRY TO
SOUTH ARE SAID TO BE GROW-
ING MORE SERIOUS EVERY
HOUR TODAY.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 — Major
General Wood today ordered the
transports Sumner and McClellan
to proceed immediately from New-
port News to Galveston, Texas,
where an infantry camp has been es-
tablished. The Prairie was also or-
dered from Newport News to Phila-
delphia to take 800 marines on board.
This will enable the United States
to land 11,000 marines on Mexican
soil within four days, and in addition
to this the United States could
send 15,000 soldiers across the bor-
der within ten days.

The Atlantic fleet at Guantanamo,
Cuba, has been ordered to prepare
quarters on each of the 11 battleship
there ready to receive 200 marines
each and be ready to sail on notice.

Conditions More Serious—

EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 18 — Revo-
lutionary conditions in Mexico are
becoming more serious and the pos-
sibility of intervention by the United
States is looming up more strongly
every hour. Several entirely dif-
ferent bands of rebels are carrying
on the revolution and there will be
several candidates for the presidency
if the Madero administration should
fall.

It is rumored that Diaz has oc-
cupied the national palace in the
city of Mexico, but this rumor is
not confirmed.

Diaz Gaining Control—

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 — Am-
bassador Wilson this afternoon tele-
graphed that the rebels have ad-
vanced within ten days.
