Coldest Since 1905. Watertown, N.Y., Jan. 13.—The coldest weather for the year was recorded here this morning, the official thermometer registering 28 degrees below zero.

COLD GREETS WILSON FAMILY

President Has Nothing to Say—Refuses to Make Speeches.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 13.—President Wilson and his family arrived here at 7:30 o'clock today from Pass Christian, Miss.

It was 18 degrees above zero when the president stepped from his private car and walked briskly through the station to the waiting automobiles.

The trip was uneventful. The president greeted crowds everywhere but made no speeches.

The Pastor believes St. Paul's thought in the text to be that wherever God may dwell is necessarily holy—His temple or His tabernacle; and that any wilful or intentional sin, depraving that temple or tabernacle, would be an offense against God.
