MINISTERIAL UNION WILL NOT DISBAND

All the Members Seem to be in Favor of Continuing It "PASTOR" RUSSELL AGAIN CONDEMNED

By a unanimous vote of the twenty-six ministers present, the Ministerial Union of Wilmington at its regular meeting in the Y. M. C. A. this morning decided to continue the organization and notice was given that at the next meeting a vote will be taken on the matter of amending the constitution so that the time of the meeting can be changed from the first Monday morning in each month to the first Tuesday of each month at 2:30 o'clock.

The advisability of continuing the organization was discussed at the M. E. Preachers' Association last Monday, and the secretary of the association instructed to confer with the secretary of the Ministerial Union in regard to this matter.

At today's meeting Mr. Alderson said while he knew there had been some wide difference of opinion on the matter of the proposed amendments to the marriage laws and various ministers had been unjustly attacked in the newspapers, which he declared ought to stop, he did not think the organization should disband, as it would be a confession that they could not dwell together in Christian harmony.
