MISSION OBSERVES SIXTH BIRTHDAY

Church Workers of Washington and Baltimore Join in Anniversary Celebration of Mission.

Church workers of Washington and Baltimore assembled yesterday to celebrate the sixth anniversary of the foundation of the Gospel Mission, at 24-25 Four-and-a-half Street Northwest. The exercises were divided into three sessions, the morning service being held in Wesley M. E. Church, the afternoon session at the mission, and the evening session in Foundry M. E. Church.

Among the philanthropies practiced by the Gospel Mission are the following: A bread line, which fed 4,200 persons last year; lodgings, which housed 22,000; employment bureau, which procured more than 100 situations; the penny lunchroom, which furnished 15,000 meals in two months; a dispensary, treating 200 patients; and a garment distribution bureau, which clothed more than 1,000 persons.

ELLSWORTH SHOT REMOVING FLAG

Representative Farr Tells Story of Tragedy in Connection with Bill for Statute.

An interesting story of an affair which started like that told in the famous poem, "Barbara Frietsche," but ended in a double tragedy, is told by Representative John R. Farr, of Pennsylvania, in connection with his bill for the erection of a statue to Col. E. M. Ellsworth, in this city.

"The seventh day of May, or first of June," was recorded in April, 1861, from the front of New York City," says Mr. Farr, "by Col. E. M. Ellsworth, a young man of twenty-four, who, before the war, had organized in Chicago a mob of 600 men and marched to the front of the Lincoln, who had been escorted to Washington by Ellsworth, appointed him to a second lieutenant in the regular army."

"On the evening of May 24, when the Union forces crossed into Virginia, Ellsworth's company occupied the city of Alexandria. The colonel, with the secretary and the captain of the regiment, a corpsman of the new York Tribune, and a sergeant's squad, was proceeding toward the center of the town, when he saw a man carrying a flag from the Marshall House. With his two companions Ellsworth ascended to the roof, leaving Private Francis S. Brown at the foot of the latter stairs. On descending the stairs with the flag in his hands, Ellsworth was shot through the heart by James T. Jackson, the keeper of the hotel, who emptied the second barrel of his shotgun at Ellsworth. The latter, who was not hit, saw Jackson through the head."

Col. Ellsworth had secured himself to President Lincoln, who was deeply affected by the death of several hours and the remains lay in state in the room of the white suite. His death made a profound impression and greatly stimulated the war feeling in the North."

PASTOR RUSSELL SEES NEW LIGHT

Preacher Predicts End of Old Order and Prophecies Violence Between Capital and Labor.

Retaining that the old order was passing away and that a new light was dawning, the errors and mistakes of dogmas and creeds out of existence, Pastor Russell of the Brooklyn and London tabernacles, spoke at the National Theater yesterday afternoon before a well-filled house, his theme being "Which is the True Gospel?"

The eminent pulpit orator appeared under auspices of the International Bible Students' Association, and was introduced to the audience by Adj. Gen. William F. Hall, U. S. A., J. T. D. Pyle, of this city, saying the opening prayer.

The speaker declared that the physical world will never come to an end, as has and is being preached by certain creeds and sects; that merely the present order of things will vanish to make room for a more perfect system of religion. He promised better days for those who labor, declaring that labor is one of the curses with which this world is afflicted.

Pastor Russell paid his respects to Pope Pius in issuing an order instructing bishops of the Catholic Church to commend to the faithful the study of the Bible. "I am sure that a time when Catholics get together to study the Bible," said the speaker, "Protestants are drifting into infidelity."

This is a time of great trouble, according to the pastor, who said this contention was demonstrated by the disunion between capital and labor. He prophesied violence between capital and labor so that each may gain its point.

JUDGES VOTE FOR TAFT

Roosevelt's Advocacy of the Recall Loses him Support.

An echo of the protest against Col. Theodore Roosevelt's gaudy advocacy of the recall of judges was heard from a number of the gentlemen of the bench, including those of the Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, when a straw vote of the judicial holding court in the District was taken Saturday.

The vote gave President Taft, 19; Col. Roosevelt, 15, and Justice Charles E. Hughes of New York, 4. Among those voting were Justices of the Supreme Court, District Court of Appeals, Court of Claims, and all courts sitting in the District, down to the Police Court.
