WOODROW WILSON'S POLITICAL FAITH.

Pocatello Tribune: Formally accepting the Democratic nomination for the presidency, Governor Wilson set forth his political "faith" last week in a document which is indefinite in most of the things in which it is definite.

In an attempt to arouse and capitalize popular discontent it resembles, in places, the platform adopted by the Progressives at Chicago on the same day. This is notable where the high cost of living and the so-called labor questions are treated.

Of the former, Mr. Wilson says: "High wages, even when we can get them, yield us no greater comfort. We used to be better off with less, because a dollar could buy so much more." This, of course, is arrant nonsense, for at no time in the country's history were the mass of the people so well off as they are today.

To the relations of capital and labor Mr. Wilson would apply the "rule of right," whatever he may mean by that, and as he does not tell us we cannot know. This phrase, of course, is simply a generality, and his discussion of the question, in which he recommends nothing, is merely for the purpose of giving the impression that he is the friend of the workingman.

When he comes to the tariff the executive is more specific and it should be immediately and steadily and steadily. Here, at least, is Governor Wilson's view on his past. For that he never in free trade is a matter of frequent public record.

Because of his free trade theories, indeed, the Democratic candidate has become very popular in England since his recent nomination, and the English papers have published many eulogistic articles about him. One of these, which is just to hand, the London Chronicle, prints an article by Rev. C. Sylvester Horne, M. P., who had an interview with Governor Wilson at his home in New Jersey, which contains the following interesting ex-

tract: "But I was keen to know why Woodrow Wilson was not a Republican, for the vast majority of men of his standing are associated with the Republican party. He was frank as anyone could wish. 'I am a free trader,' he said and repeated the formula about tariff for revenue only. He does not believe that any statesman can really benefit the poorest classes in America except by fighting down the tariff. That is why he could not be a Republican."

Certainly Woodrow Wilson could not be a Republican. And as certain no one who believes in adequately protecting American labor from the cheaper labor of Europe and Asia, and of preserving the American market for American products, could vote for him. Mr. Wilson's popularity in England is easily understood—as has been the popularity of most—Democratic free trade candidates—but it is American interests that will be considered by the intelligent voters of the country.

Mr. Wilson's attack on the tariff was very effectively answered by President Taft in his speech of acceptance a week ago. After riddling the assertion that the present tariff was not a well considered revision, the president followed with the further statement that the Payne-Aldrich measure has raised our exports to a total never reached before and that our domestic trade is in a condition of unprecedented prosperity. On these rocks of fact declamations against the tariff break into splinters.

The portions of Governor Wilson's address devoted to the development of the American merchant marine and the operation of the Panama canal are what might be expected from a man holding his well known free-trade views. We should have more merchant ships, he says, but we must not get them by means of bounties or subsidies, nor by remitting canal tolls for American vessels.

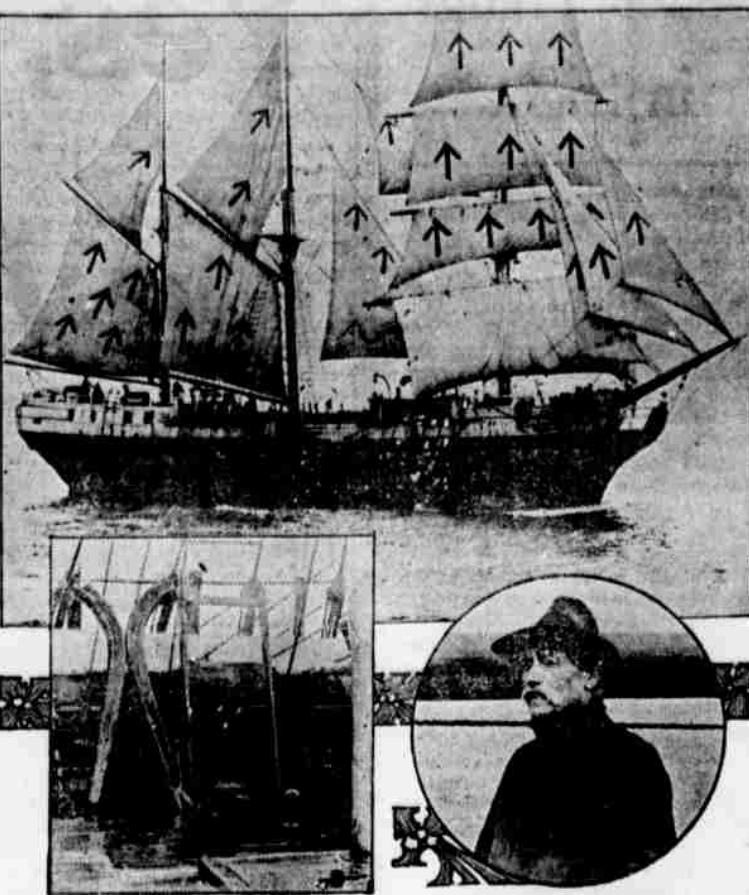
As to just how we are to get them, then, Mr. Wilson leaves us beautifully in the dark. It is hard to see how the "rule of right and justice" which he applies to other questions would operate in this case, yet that is about as near as Mr. Wilson comes to a definite recommendation.

Convict Ship Success, Built In 1790, Crosses the Atlantic

ARRIVING at Boston recently, the convict ship Success completed a voyage that is considered the most noteworthy feat of seamanship since Columbus sailed his gallant fleet in 1492. The Success is the oldest known ship afloat and is the oldest which ever crossed the Atlantic ocean. She was built in 1790 by coolie labor in India. She sailed from Glasgow dock, Lancaster, England, on April 15 for the voyage just ended under command of Captain John Scott. The Success is built of teakwood throughout. After sailing in the spice trade for several years she became a convict ship and as such the dwelling place of England's worst malefactors. There are scores of cells below decks—little, narrow, dark, damp cells which lock with a big bolt on the outside. On either side of the lower deck are horror striking black holes into which refractory prisoners were placed. These places are two feet eight inches across, and air is admitted through a few small holes in an iron plate. The ship is equipped with flogging posts and chains. The sails still carry the arrows, the English prison sign. At the lower right corner is a picture of Captain Scott, while at the left is a view of frames to which convicts were tied to be flogged.

PASTOR RUSSELL AND BILLY SUNDAY DISAGREE ON HELL FIRE

The "Anti Hell Fire and Brimstone" Resolution Adopted in Washington D. C. Draws the Fire of Clergymen Everywhere.

Almost Unanimous Ministerial Repudiation of the "Hell Fire and Brimstone" Theory.

The hot Mid-Summer Convent on of the International Bible Students at Glen Echo Park, Washington, D. C., in passing their now famous resolution, made so big a noise about "Hell Fire and Brimstone" that the old ecclesiastical line-up was thoroughly routed and put to flight, and an entirely new formation of forces is now in the making. It surely was a big gun that was fired from Glen Echo into the camp of the stand-patters, and the noise will echo and re-echo throughout the ecclesiastical heavens for some time to come.

Indian fighter of the past, in calling for the public repudiation of the hell fire theory, claimed that to do so would create a situation in America that would enable thousands of ministers to publicly declare what they freely admit privately. The desired repudiation was made and the general spontaneous response from ministers of all denominations vindicates the General as an excellent tactician.

The present general repudiation of the hell fire theory by the clergy of the Evangelical Alliance will no doubt be considered by the public as a startling admission, and is in striking contrast with the opinion still held by ninety per cent of the people who were reared under and taught by these same clergy. The impressions gained in childhood from the ministers that the bible was the authority for the fire and brimstone hell will be hard to erase. It is acknowledged that seventy-five per cent of the people reared under sectarian instruction, when arriving at the age of discretion, discard as un-Christian and unreasonable the hell fire mythology of the middle ages and as they believe the bible responsible for the doctrine, they lose respect for the bible and for the church and discard both and join the big congregation composed of detached Christians and skeptics.

The mid-summer resolution repudiating and relegating to the ash heap the red hot hell fire deception, so wonderfully described by Milton and Dante, and pictured by Gustave Dore, will probably be likened unto Shakespeare's "Mid-Summer Night's Dream" by Billy Sunday, Gypsy Smith and their kind. It's tough on these gentlemen, too, at this stage of their illustrious career, to be deprived of their hell fire works and brimstone, their only argument. Their undoing however, will be a sweet morsel for the men and religion congress people, who have declared against "itinerant evangelists."

From among the hundreds of recently published expressions from leading clergymen of all denominations on the Washington "anti-hell fire" resolution we quote:

Canon Henson of Westminster Abbey in confirming repudiation of the eternal torment doctrine of the "dark ages," said: "I think the American religious public is generations behind us, although I don't say that individual American divines aren't the equal of ours."

The famous R. J. Campbell, of London, representing the Non-Conformist view, said: "This seems to me to be a very belated pronouncement. I do

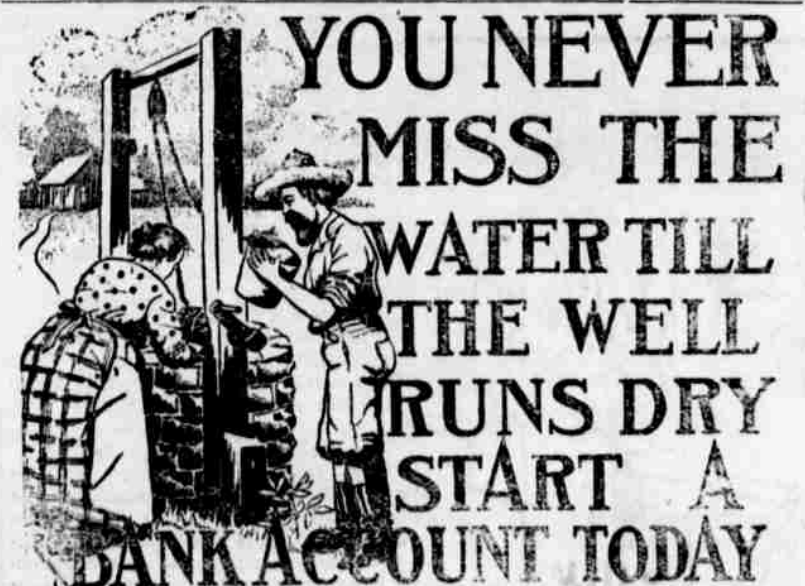
