Both Sides of the New Jitne Ordinance Question

A LAWYER'S VIEW. The proposed ordinance to regulate the jitne cars, designated as "motor jitnes" which is now before the city council, is one of much public interest, for there are many who would be exasperated with the jitnes, while others favor them.

WHAT JITNE MEN SAY. C. A. Stewart, of the International Auto company, discussing the ordinance, said: "If the city council passes the proposed ordinance, which is intended to drive the jitne cars out of business, every man and woman in this city will cry out in bitter protest."

THE ORGANIZER'S VIEW. Dick Evans, organizer for the Jitne Drivers' association, said: "We are only asking for a square deal and intend to get it, even though we must carry the matter to court. The people are with us, which means our ultimate triumph."

THE ORGANIZER'S VIEW (continued). The ordinance provides that no license shall be issued until the applicant thereto has passed a written examination before the chief of police or some one designated by him. Here we have a power which does not exist, or at least is doubtful, in the council attempted by it to be delegated first to the chief of police, and then by him to some one else, and so on ad infinitum, and it will be observed that this duty of examining and passing upon the applicant's qualifications is not a mere technical matter, but one which involves the exercise of discretion, and the council has the power to institute an examination into the qualifications of the applicant, the power could not be delegated.
