

NURSING IN RURAL SECTIONS PLANNED BY THE RED CROSS

Annual Meeting of Central Committee of Society to Be Held Next Month.

The comprehensive plans of the American Red Cross for the organization of a rural nursing service and the plans for a national-wide education of women in first aid and home nursing will be explained in detail at the annual meeting of the central committee of the Red Cross, which will be held December 11 at the Willard.

The program comprises a morning and afternoon session. At the latter President Taft will preside.

The activities of the district chapter will be described by Mrs. Theodora N. McLaughlin, Christmas seals and their sale will be treated by Secretary Charles L. Magee, and the work of the war relief board will be reported by Brig. Gen. George H. Torney, Major Charles Lyman, and Miss Jane A. Deane.

National Director W. F. Blackall will make a report on the work of the national relief board, and Huntington Wilson, Assistant Secretary of state, will describe the work of the international relief board. A meeting of the board of incorporators will be held at 12:30, and at 1 o'clock a luncheon will be served to delegates.

The afternoon session will comprise a series of reports. Maj. Gen. George W. Davis will report the work of the central committee, W. Frank Parsons, of New York, will describe the Titanic relief, and the work done for Mississippi flood sufferers will be reported by C. M. Hubbard and E. P. Bicknell. The West Virginia flood relief will be reported by James F. Jackson, Miss Mabel T. Boardman, will discuss problems of the Red Cross in the relief of the flood, and the plans for the first aid and home nursing organization by Miss Marion Oliver.

HERE FROM TURKEY TO CLAIM ESTATE

Madame Alia Bent Mahmud Aveni Appeals to Government.

Mme. Alia bent Mahmud Aveni and her husband, Hossain Aveni, a Turkish merchant, are in Washington to take up with the State Department today the proper settlement of a large estate in Morocco by George MacLavin, of Philadelphia, her former husband, who died in Feb two years ago. It is alleged by the woman that the American consul in Morocco has been extremely discourteous to her and that in the settlement of the estate she has gotten only a part of it, administrators of the estate being permitted to take out big fees, she now demands a satisfactory settlement, and asks the State Department to assist her in it, as her former husband was an American citizen.

It is said that MacLavin left an estate in Philadelphia valued at \$50,000 to his wife, now Mme. Aveni, but no great trouble has been experienced in settling this claim.

THANKSGIVING DAY PLANS UNDER WAY

Washington Will Celebrate in Various Ways—Special Services Arranged in Churches All Over City.

A nation, reaping from its millions of acres of fertile land the greatest harvest ever in its history, today is completing plans for a fitting commemoration of Thanksgiving Day. Washington, the hub of the wheel of government, was all in a hustle and bustle today making arrangements for the celebration of the event, which, next to Christmas Day and the Fourth of July, is nearest to the hearts of all true Americans.

While the man of means, able to have upon his table all that his heart desires, has more to look for on this day than those less fortunate, still the humble and needy will in some way or another be remembered. Rallying to the help of the seven hundred almost penniless who know not what it is to be able to enjoy a feast of their own table, the Salvation Army, the Gospel Mission, the Central Union Mission, the Associated Charities, and many of the churches, in the effort to care for all the unfortunate some miserably neglected, but the local doors of charity hope this will not be the case.

Sentiments Are Varied. From the rise of the sun until twilight the citizens of the District will give vent to feelings of appreciation, their sentiments being manifested in various ways. Some will not consider the day well spent unless they take to the fields and woods in quest of game. Others more pious in their views will be to their churches and there join in song and praise of Him who blessed them.

At Calvary Baptist Church the congregations of more than twenty churches of this denomination meet at 11 o'clock in union praise and song service. A choir of more than fifty voices will sing. The Rev. E. D. Gaw, pastor of the West Washington Baptist Church, will preach the sermon. "The Three Great Scourges" is the subject of the special service. The Rev. Samuel Woodrow, pastor of the First Congregational, will deliver at 11 o'clock in a union praise and song service. The church choir of fifty voices will render a special program of appropriate songs. The Eastern Presbyterian Church and the Metropolitan Presbyterian Church join in a praise service at the last named church, where the Rev. Paul Hickok, pastor of the Metropolitan Church, preaches the Thanksgiving sermon, his subject being "Fidelity and Here We Join in the Church of the Epiphany, at 11 o'clock, a special service will be held.

BREEDING STALLION IS PURCHASED FOR REMOUNTS IN ARMY

Dr. Rommel Buys Solid Bay Trotter at Old Glory Sale.

Uncle Sam, in the guise of Dr. Rommel, chief of the division of animal husbandry, and the board of Government and private breeding experts, has just made the first purchase of a breeding stallion, for the breeding of army remounts, at the Old Glory sale.

The solid bay trotting stallion MacNune was purchased at the Old Glory horse sale in Madison Square Garden, New York. His price was \$24,000, the amount being drawn from the appropriation of \$200,000 by Congress for the purpose of establishing a Government stud for the army.

MacNune, a handsome horse, will be sent to the Government breeding farm at either Front Royal, Va., or to the farm at Middleburg, Va., operated by the Government and a lot of talk at the sale and in horse circles throughout the country.
