Swing of the Irish Troops Is Different From Others

Just as an Irish Rugby team is utterly different in its temper from an English, Welsh or Scottish Rugby team, so is an Irish regiment utterly different from an English, Welsh or Scottish regiment. I do not say that its temper is finer. I say it is different. At Lord Roberts' funeral I stood on the Thames embankment beside an English war correspondent. As the soldiers went by in the rain we tried to identify the various regiments. One very smart regiment puzzled us. Suddenly we fixed our eyes on a great, strapping soldier with a roush eye and a devilmay-care gait in it. His khaki cap was cocked rakishly over one eyebrow. "Irish, of course," said the English war correspondent. "You can't mistake that fellow." It was the Irish guards. Even in the mud and rain they looked uproariously and outrageously Irish. And I remembered how, not many months ago, the Irish guards (now fighting in Flanders) cheered John Redmond and John Dillon.

In the rain-soaked twilight one evening I stood at the corner of a street in Cork and watched an Irish regiment swinging past on its way back from a long route march. Were they weary? Not at all. They went up the murky hill to their barracks with a rhythmic dash that sent my heart into my mouth. I have thrilled to the rhythm of the Grenadier guards at the end of a route march. But the rhythm of this Irish regiment, though not finer, was different. There is only one word for it — there was more devil in its rhythm. It reminded me of the rhythm of a rush down the field by a pack of Irish forwards. The corporate soul of the regiment was in the rhythm, and the soul was Irish. The drums and flutes were playing a queer wild Irish tune, and at intervals each section barked like a pack of hounds. That fierce bark went down the regiment from front to rear, bark after bark, like a series of volleys—the vocal attack, as a musician would say, being perfect. As I heard it, I knew that I was listening, not to a mob, but to a regiment—an Irish regiment—and there were tears of pride in my eyes as the long pulsing line of steel swept like a live thing around the corner up the dark hill.

this demand and immense audiences listen to him with great interest. His previous successful interpretations give his present lectures peculiar interest. The pastor claims to be an optimist of the most pronounced type, but according to his own statements, he does not expect the present war to end until it has greatly weakened the nations involved. As a religious writer he has the distinction of being the author of a series of books on Bible study having a circulation now said to exceed eight million. During the past year his picture story of the Bible, "Creation," has been presented throughout this country and Europe and created quite a sensation, as it is the first successful effort to present a systematic course in Bible study by means of motion pictures. The Bible Students association, which has financed its presentation, reports that this progressive evangelistic effort has proven highly successful in reaching the people with religion. Many millions have witnessed the production.

One of the provisions invariably made by Pastor Russell is that he will speak only where admission is free to the public and no collections lifted. It is announced that the next Thursday lecture will be under these conditions.

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NEW YORK WAITERS THREATEN STRIKE Plans Laid to Tie Up Restaurants and Hotels in Big City. NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Waiters and kitchen workers have formulated plans for a strike that will affect hotels and restaurants in the theatrical district, as well as many leading clubs. The plans include the tying up of every restaurant and diner room as far north as One Hundred and fifty-fifth street unless the demands of the union men are met by the employers. The Hotel and Restaurant Employees' International Alliance of America, to which the waiters belong, held a stormy session at its headquarters today. William Lesman, general organizer, declared that he was confident that the men would vote to strike. The demands of the waiters and kitchen workers are for a ten-hour day, pay for overtime and one day off each week. Leaders of the organization said that they were in ready negotiating with the hotel association. At five of the leading hotels in the theater district—the Manhattan Knickerbocker, Astor, McAlpin and Waldorf-Astoria and at Rector's restaurant—it was said that rumors of the strike had been heard. At the offices of the hotel association it was said that no negotiations with the unions had been entered into.

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Oil and Gas Strike in Lindsay Field The Santa Fe railway, who speeded in on the northwest quarter of 2-2-5 on September 30, struck a good showing of oil Wednesday morning with an estimated gusher of 1,000,000 feet at a depth of 600 feet. By this strike the Santa Fe has formally opened the new Lindsay oil field, Oklahoma City, Chickasha, Patsis Valley and Purcell oil men left Lindsay in automobiles for the new field immediately. Officials of the company have ordered the test to continue through the second sand. Great activity in leasing over entire field. 212 TANKS IN HEALDTON FIELD These Are Filled With 9,687,000 Gallons of Oil, According to Report. Special to The World. OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 28.—There are 212 steel tanks in the Healdton oil field filled with 9,687,000 barrels of oil on October 21, according to a report that has been made to the corporation commission. It is supposed that the oil is being conserved in tanks on the theory that the price is going to take an upward jump soon. From another source the report is made to the commission that the storage is accumulating at the rate of 30,000 barrels a day. The present daily potential production of the Oklahoma oil fields is given at 275,000 barrels. Of this the Cushing field is producing 110,000 barrels, the Healdton field 45,000 barrels and the remainder at other places in the state. According to posted prices, this would yield \$225,000 daily to the oil industry, if it were all being sold and delivered. The posted price in the Cushing field is 50 cents and in the Healdton field 40 cents, the latter nearly as low as the lowest it went in the Healdton field two or three years ago.
