PASTOR RUSSELL'S TEACHINGS EXAMINED

The closing feature of the photo-drama of Creation was given here yesterday, when the general secretary of the International Bible Students' Association addressed a large gathering on the subject, "Pastor Russell's Teachings Examined."

The speaker said that "Pastor Russell's Movies," as they are popularly called, are arousing much interest in Bible study everywhere they go. Many who have seen them here during the past few weeks are studying their Bibles with renewed interest. The speaker referred to Pastor Russell's extensive tours and free Bible lectures, to his sermons, which reach twenty million people each week through over two thousand newspapers, and to his famous Studies in the Scriptures, now translated into nineteen languages, which he has given by the millions to the public at less than cost. "The Photo-Drama of Creation, however, is undoubtedly Pastor Russell's greatest and most philanthropic achievement on behalf of public instruction in the Bible."

In treating on Pastor Russell's teachings, the lecturer considered what he deemed the seven cardinal points:

First, Pastor Russell's conception of God. While many were said to be drifting into the worship of a "nature god" or some abstract principle such as "the all-good," Pastor Russell was said to earnestly contend for the God of the Bible, the personal God, who created all things, who loves His creatures and plans for their highest welfare.

Pastor Russell's views concerning the Bible were next considered. He was said to be most positive in his convictions concerning the inspiration of the Scriptures, thus bringing upon himself the hatred and persecution of many opposing ministers and higher critics. "Noah and the Flood," continued the speaker, "is considered by many to be a myth, while the account of Jonah and the Whale is generally conceded to be the biggest fish story ever told. Pastor Russell, however, points to the Lord's own words regarding Noah and Jonah, as proof that those who deny the veracity of the original accounts are in fact denying the Lord's own statement of the same and repudiating Him as a false teacher. It is for the public to decide whether or not Pastor Russell takes the correct view."

Concerning man Pastor Russell's views were said to differ from those of the evolutionists in that he still holds to the Biblical statement that man was created in God's image instead of being evolved from a monkey prototype. His fall from perfection brought death from which his only hope of deliverance lies in a resurrection.

Want Curve Eliminated

PATRONS OF NEW POSTOFFICE ARE INCONVENIENCED BY WALK.

If the post office authorities at Washington agree to the plan which is maturing at the present time, the sharp curve in the concrete walk which leads to the new post office building from the corner of Monroe and Meredith streets, may be eliminated.

Since the occupation of the new building many complaints have been heard from patrons of the office concerning the inconvenience of this walk. Persons going to the post office by this entrance and the location of the building causes this entrance to be used more than the main one, must of necessity turn this curve at almost a right angle, when a little change in the construction of the walk would eliminate all the trouble.

The matter has been taken up by the city commissioners and City Consulting Engineer W. S. Mayers has prepared a sketch of the walk showing how the trouble can be remedied by straightening to a great extent the degree of the curve without destroying the architectural beauty of the premises. This sketch will be filed with Mr. Fleming, the postmaster, who will forward it to the proper authorities in Washington. It is thought that they will see the justice of the claim and enter the necessary order to have the matter adjusted to the best advantage.

FACT BINDS CHILE AND UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—Minister Suarez of Chile and Secretary Bryan today agreed upon the terms of a peace commission treaty which will bind Chile and the United States to submit to arbitration all differences which cannot be settled by diplomacy.

The new treaty, which later will be signed simultaneously with similar pacts between the United States and Argentina and Brazil, will provide that questions at issue shall be submitted to an international commission of five members for investigation for a period of at least one year, during which time hostilities shall not be entered into.
