

PASTOR RUSSELL, FAMOUS DIVINE, SEES WORLD'S END IN OCT. 1914

Pastor Russell, the famous divine who was in Honolulu some weeks ago on his way out to the Orient at the head of the party of six investigating foreign missions, is quoted in a Manila paper as predicting the end of the world for October, 1914.

The paper says: "That the world as it is now constituted will come to an end in October, 1914, is the central tenet of Russellism. Believing that the end of the material world is near and that only through 'sacrifice' of their material substance they can become of the 'elect' under the New Dispensation, hundreds of Russell's followers are turning their property over to him in preparation for the end.

"Many of them give it outright, and in that case he sometimes assures them an annuity as long as they live. Others deed it to him in their wills. As October, 1914, the time Russell fixes as marking the end of 'Gentile times' approaches, the number of donations is increasing.

"In all his books and early writings, Russell fixed the inauguration of the Messiah's Kingdom definitely for October, 1914. He has taken the prophecies of Daniel, foretelling a time of trouble, and every time there is a strike or a revolution 'Pastor' Russell points out to his followers that this goes to show our near approach to the Millennium Dawn.

"In 'The Watch Tower' of January of this year, of which thirty thousand copies were printed and scattered everywhere, he declares that 'strife,

lockouts, panic, etc.—will be prominent factors in the precipitation of the anarchy which all so justly dread.

"While the world is outwardly at peace there is great unrest in the hearts of humanity. Only the Lord knows to what extent and how long the winds of strife will be held, as pictorially set forth in the Revelation.

"In 'The Studies in the Scriptures' Russell explains a carefully worked-out chronological system which Russellites declare to be infallible, and according to which the present world must end in October, 1914. Having established this idea, Russell proceeds to glorify 'sacrifice' as the best way of becoming a member of the 'elect' who will enjoy ground floor privileges in the New Dispensation. His followers are urged to give up their money to spread the 'Glad Tidings' for 'The heavenly things are to be attained only by those who sacrifice earthly things.'—(Watch Tower, October 15, 1911, page 392).

"Pastor Russell has found this prognostication of the end of all things particularly effective with persons in whose family there has recently been a death. In small towns throughout New York, Pennsylvania, and other States, Russell's agents make it a practice to attend funeral services, where they warn people that 'the age of wrath is at hand,' and distribute the Russell literature. Relatives are urged to make a contribution for spreading the 'Glad Tidings' as a memorial to the dead, and frequently do so.
