Californians Meet

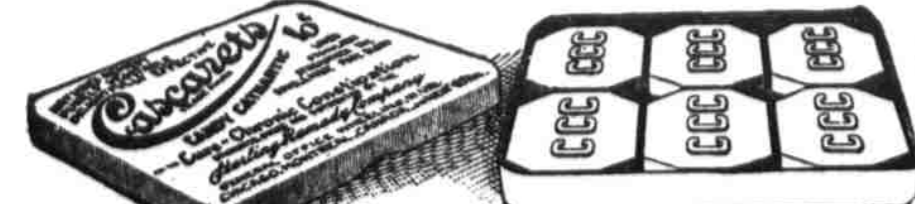

BOY'S BODY FISHED OUT OF POTOMAC BY CAPITAL POLICE

Disappearance of John Warren Jones Solved After Companion Talks.

Mystery surrounding the disappearance of John Warren Jones, eight years old, who had been missing since Saturday afternoon from his home, 812 G street southwest, was cleared this morning, when the boy's body was found in about ten feet of water off the wharf of Jackson's lumber yard, near the foot of Eighth street southwest.

Story Told By Boy.

According to the story told by the Miller boy, he and young Jones had been playing around the wharves in the morning. In the afternoon they went back. They were climbing over some piles of lumber on Jackson's wharf when Jones disappeared.

Mother Is Prostrated.

The boy's mother was prostrated with grief when informed that her son's body had been found in the river. She believed he had been lured away from home by some stranger, and the news of his death came as a great shock to her.
