PREPARE YE FOR THE KINGDOM.

Luke III, 1-7—Feb. 18. "Repent ye, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand."—Matthew III, 2.

John the Baptist was the last of the Prophets and Jesus declared that none of them was his superior. "There hath not arisen a greater Prophet than John the Baptist—and yet I say unto you that the least in the Kingdom of Heaven is greater than he." (Mat. xi, 11.) Every member of the Kingdom of Heaven must be like John because he was the King by whose reign of a thousand years the work of Satan would be undone; the head of the Serpent would be crushed and humanity would be uplifted out of sin and death and be brought back to the condition in which Adam was at first.

God promised Abraham, "the friend of God," that this great blessing should come to humanity through his posterity; indeed all of the saved ones should be known as his posterity in that they would become proselyte members of Israel. Messiah was promised to be of Abraham's seed, also, and it was to be through this Messiah that Abraham's natural posterity would be blessed, and would be made a channel of blessing to all nations. One thing not explained to Abraham was that Messiah would have a company of joint-heirs selected from amongst men and countries the "Body of Christ," or "the Bride, the Lamb's Wife."

Necessarily to the Jew First. Although God has not mentioned this "elect" class which He purposed should be members of the Messiah, His Bride, nevertheless God determined that the opportunity to become members of this elect, special class should first of all go to Abraham's natural seed. For the three and a half years of Jesus' ministry and for a further three and a half years after His death the privilege of becoming His Bride and joint-heirs was limited to Israel after the flesh. Later, it was sent on equal terms also to the Gentiles. Saint Paul tells us that it was necessary that the Gospel Message should go first to the Jews because this was the Divine arrangement. But he adds, "Israel hath not obtained that which he seeketh for"—the best of God's gifts, the privilege of becoming members of the spiritual Israel; "indeed, the election hath obtained it and the rest were blinded." (Rom. xi, 7.) The blindness is not to be forever, but merely until the completion of the "elect," spiritual class—then the blindness is to pass away and Israel is to be saved or recovered to the Divine favor lost eighteen centuries ago. (See Romans ix, 25-33.)

As Jesus declared, "My Kingdom is not of this world (Age)." and as He did not establish His Kingdom at His first advent, but merely began the work of calling the "elect" to the work of John the Baptist was merely to the Jew and proportionately only was he the antitype of Elijah. A larger antitype of Jesus, and of Elijah and John as forerunners, we may now see. Jesus in the flesh and all His faithful members in the flesh for eighteen centuries have constituted the antitype of John the Baptist, the King whose Kingdom they announced to Israel; "but the election hath obtained it and the rest were blinded." (Rom. xi, 7.) The blindness is not to be forever, but merely until the completion of the "elect," spiritual class—then the blindness is to pass away and Israel is to be saved or recovered to the Divine favor lost eighteen centuries ago. (See Romans ix, 25-33.)
