SPECIAL SERVICES DURING THE WEEK

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SOWING AND REAPING.

Galatians 6:11-10. Nov. 8. "Whoever sows a seed, shall also reap."--Verse 7.

Today's Study was intended, by those mapping out these lessons, to be a temperance lesson. There is surely a sense in which it is true that those who yield to appetites craving injurious stimulants and narcotics will certainly reap a corresponding weakening of character. All people who have at heart, the welfare of humanity must surely deplore the ravages of intemperance; and any word or example that would assist fellow creatures to become strong, useful members of society should not be withheld.

We may be sure, however, that nothing will thoroughly liberate mankind from the weaknesses of their fallen nature except God's appointed remedy--Messiah's Kingdom. But this conviction should not hinder us from taking our place publicly on the side of righteousness and humanity's best interests in respect to every question.

Let us not go to the extreme which some would approve, but follow the Bible teachings. Pursuing this course now, it is our duty to point out that the Apostle's words have no reference whatever to one kind of intemperance more than another. The Apostle is addressing neither the world in general nor some poor inebriates. As the opening verses of the Epistle declare, he is addressing the consecrated people of God.

The Law of Christ.

These consecrated Christians the Apostle speaks of as brethren, and instructs them how to deal with any of their fellows who might be overtaken in a fault. The most spiritual ones of the Church should exercise themselves to restore the erring one to a condition of righteousness with God. This they should do meekly, remembering that they also are imperfect in the flesh and that they also may at some time inadvertently fall into sin, contrary to their heart intentions.

Thus they were to "bear one another's burdens"--assisting one another in battling against the weakness of the flesh and the besetments of sin. In this way they would fulfill the general law of Christ--self-sacrifice in the interests of others. Those who, finding a brother overtaken in a fault, merely throw back their heads, denouncing the brother in a haughty,

Along this line there is no room for clericalism. holier-than-thou manner, have not as yet attained a proper appreciation of the law of Christ, which is to govern all the members of the Body.

This law, the Apostle points out, is a law of love. Governed by this law, our Lord laid down His life even for His enemies. All who claim to be His followers should have the same mind, the same disposition, the same spirit, and should seek to assist the brethren out of difficulty and to bring them nearer to the Lord and His glorious standards.

Too Much Self-Esteem.

The Apostle shows that one great danger which besets all true followers of Jesus is headiness--thinking too highly of self, and, therefore, not highly enough of the brethren--especially if they stumble in some particular in which this individual has not stumbled as yet.

One of the first lessons to be learned in that we are really nothing, that we are bundles of imperfection, that on the strength of our own merit we could not have God's favor, and that in proportion as we think of ourselves as somebody, to that extent we are displeasing to God and in His sight all the more nobody. Whoever thinks of himself as somebody in God's sight should begin to realize that he is nothing, except through Divine favor in Christ. Such a person deceives himself and hinders his own progress in the good way.

Each one, therefore, instead of judging or reproving his neighbor or his brother in Christ, should prove his own work. He should carefully discern to what extent he has put away anger, malice, hatred, envy, strife, and put on meekness, gentleness, patience, long-suffering, brotherly kindness, love. To the extent in which he is progressing in these graces of God's Holy Spirit he has ground for rejoicing, without in any degree seeking to estimate himself by the imperfections of others. Thus should each seek to find out his own weaknesses, to bear his own burdens, and not to be a reproach to others.
