## THE GRACE OF GOD FOR ALL MANKIND

### God's Special Blessing For Church of First-Borns.

His Secondary Blessing Will Remove the Curse of Death From the World. After-Borns Will Be Thousands of Millions—As Sand of the Sea.



Springfield, Ill., Oct. 6.—Pastor Russell's address here at the State Fair Grounds this afternoon was from the text: "The grace of God which bringeth salvation hath appeared for all men." (Titus ii, 11.) He said in part:—

As Bible students we find it more and more necessary to study the Scriptures discriminately. We find the Scriptures continually setting before us the high standard of Divine Justice, and also setting before us the fact that Divine Love has provided mercy for the sinner through the efficacy of the Redeemer's sacrifice. Hitherto, however, God's people have unwittingly narrowed down the grace of God and minimized the work of Christ and the efficacy of the redemptive sacrifice by asserting that all the blessings are for the Church and none for the world.

Church's Pentecost—and the World's. Many of us had not noticed until recently that two Pentecostal blessings are mentioned by the Prophet. Our overlooking this was doubtless because it was not due time for this feature to be clearly understood.

Another reason for its being overlooked is that by Divine arrangement the world's Pentecost was mentioned first, and that of the Church last. But even this is appropriate; the Divine intention was primarily the world's salvation; that of the Church comes incidentally.

"It shall come to pass, saith the Lord, at the end of those days, that I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh. . . . and in those days I will pour out My spirit upon My servants and upon My handmaidens."—Joel ii, 28, 29; Acts ii, 17.

St. Peter, in quoting the prophecy, properly applied only the portion which was due in his day, namely, that portion applicable to the servants and handmaidens of the Lord—the Church class. He left without comment the major portion of the promise, which relates to the world, and which cannot have fulfillment until the elect Church shall have been completed and glorified. The two features of the prophecy are distinctly marked, the one blessing to be upon God's servants and handmaidens only; the other to be upon all flesh. The one was to be "in those days," the other, "after those days."

Jubilee Day—Jubilee Year. The Day of Pentecost was the grand Jubilee Day, in which God's blessing was attained, marking the forgiveness of sin and the acceptance by the Heavenly Father. It was the 50th day (7 times 7 plus 1). Every Jewish Sabbath pointed to this Jubilee Day as the culmination of the Sabbath day system. It was thus the antitype toward which all Sabbath days pointed. The word "Sabbath," as is well known, signifies rest, and this culmination of the Sabbath days in the fiftieth day signified the ultimate or completeness of the rest. Thus was symbolically taught in the Law the fact that full and complete rest from sin and the Law was to be attained.

On Pentecost Day the living believers of that time entered into rest in a sense and degree never before enjoyed or even understood. The Pentecostal blessings of the Holy Spirit brought to them the full assurance of sins forgiven, through the merit of Christ's sacrifice and it also brought to them proof of their acceptance by the Heavenly Father as heirs of God and joint-heirs with Jesus Christ our Lord.

But it will be remembered that within the Law given to Israel there was not only a seven-day series of Sabbaths, but also a seven-year series of Sabbaths. Each seventh year was a Sabbath year, leading up to a Jubilee (7 times 7 plus 1), the fiftieth. As the day Sabbath reached a glorious culmination for the Church, at Pentecost, so the year Sabbath will reach a glorious climax for the world. The fiftieth year was the Jubilee Year, in which the people obtained rest in a very full and complete sense. In that year all debts were cancelled, and all who had been sold into slavery for debt went free. The whole people had a fresh start every Jubilee Year; they had rest from all their past errors and imperfections of conduct and judgment.

This pictured the coming blessing—when He shall reign and when through the merit of His sacrifice all sin will be forgiven and all slavery to sin and death will be abolished.

As the Church has been, for more than eighteen centuries, enjoying the blessings and privileges typified by the fiftieth, or Jubilee Day, so the world for a thousand years will enjoy the blessings and privileges typified by the Jubilee Year. But the Messianic blessings will not be forced upon men. Rather, they will be exhibited to all, and the eyes of the blind of the world will be opened and all will thus be privileged to know of, and to enter into the enjoyment of the Jubilee blessings.

## SAVED BY FAITH, NOT NOW BY WORKS

### "It Is Not of Yourselves; It Is the Gift of God."

Pastor Russell Points Out That Present Age Is the Faith Age—Next Age Will Be the Age of Works—Address to a Large Convention of Bible Students.



Hallfax, N. S., Sept. 29.—Pastor Russell addressed a large Convention of Bible Students here. He received closest attention. We report one of the discourses from the text, "For by grace ye are saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God."—Ephesians ii, 8.

The speaker conceded that the subject of faith and its relation to salvation had been considerably confused in the minds of many for centuries. He held, however, that clearer views are now permeating Christian minds and hearts and that the conflict between salvation by faith and salvation by works is at an end. Both are now seen to be necessary.

Age of Faith—Age of Works. Pastor Russell declared the present Age the Age of faith and the oncoming period of Messiah's Kingdom the Age of works. He cautioned his hearers, nevertheless, that, in harmony with what he had already shown in the Scriptures, this does not mean that no works are now required nor that in the future Age no faith will be required. The standard or test now is faith and not works. The standard or test of the next Age will be works, not faith. The reason of this difference, he said, was manifest: because of the fallen condition of the entire race none could do perfect works now, and, if judged by works, all would be condemned afresh. Hence God now in dealing with the Church requires them to walk by faith and not by sight.

In the next Age, during Messiah's reign, he claimed that all the clouds and darkness, and the ignorance and superstition, will pass away before the rising Sun of Righteousness. As a result faith in the next Age will be a very simple matter. Knowledge will be so great that faith will take second place. Then good works will gradually become the test and mankind will gradually rise out of imperfection of mind and body. All the willing and obedient will be able to do better and better until finally, by the time of the close of Messiah's reign, all the willing and obedient will be perfected and able to do perfect works. And their judgment will be according to works.

The Present Grace Age. Everything that God has arranged for human salvation is properly said to be of His grace. God is not bound by justice to do anything at all for humanity; therefore whatever is done is of Grace or unmerited favor. The next Age also will indirectly be an Age of Grace in that all the blessings that will go to mankind in the way of earthly restitution will be unmerited, so far as they are concerned. But the Grace of that time will more particularly be the Grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, because all those blessings will come from His having met the demands of Justice on man's behalf.

But the present Age is peculiarly one of Divine Grace because the call of the Church and the great blessing she is to receive as the Bride of Christ is something more than was purchased by the death of Jesus. Jesus merely purchased human rights and human nature for mankind by the sacrifice of His own human rights and human nature. God's grace is manifest now in that the Church is called to a glory, honor, immortality, Divine nature, which she never had and never lost and which was never redeemed by Jesus' sacrifice or otherwise.

The merit of Jesus applied to the Church now in response to faith and obedience justifies us in God's sight to the extent of permitting us to present our bodies living sacrifices. But Grace provides that this sacrificing on our part shall be counted in as though it were a part of Jesus' sacrifice.

"That Not of Yourselves." How shall we understand this statement? Surely God does not exercise faith for us and then consider it something on our part which He is willing to reward. The explanation is this: Faith is possible only where it has a basis of knowledge. In proportion as Divine providence grants us knowledge of Divine things it is possible for us to exercise faith proportionately. And our works in harmony with such faith demonstrate the sincerity of our faith.

The same principle continues throughout this Christian Age. Grace opens the way for knowledge. Knowledge paves the way for faith and begetting of the Holy Spirit. Then works to the extent of opportunity should demonstrate the degree and quantity and sincerity and loyalty of the faith. The present Age is the test time for the Church. Perfect faith is possible to be attained and must be attained, if we would have the highest blessing God is now offering. And if we have that highest faith, God will see it in our works and endeavors, however imperfect they may appear to others.

First published August 3, 1912. **HOUSE CONCURS WITH RESOLUTION NO. 3** Granting equal rights and privileges to women. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected to each House there concurring thereon: That the following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas be hereby submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: SECTION 1. The rights of citizens of the state of Kansas to vote and hold office shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex. SEC. 2. This proposition shall be submitted to the electors of this state at the election for representatives to the Legislature in the year 1913. The amendment hereby proposed shall be known on the official ballot by the following title: Amendment to the constitution granting equal rights and privileges to women, and the vote for or against such amendment shall be taken as provided by law. SEC. 3. This amendment, if adopted, shall be known as section 3 of article 5 of the constitution of the state of Kansas. SEC. 4.
