

WHERE IS THY BROTHER?

AM I MY BROTHER'S
KEEPER?

Crowds Attend Pastor Russell's
Address to Richmond
Bible Students.



PASTOR RUSSELL

Richmond, Va.,
August 27th.—Pastor
Russell of Brooklyn Taber-
nacle preached here today under
the auspices of the International
Bible Students Association (Local
Branch—Unitarian).
composed of the
truth-hungry from
all denominations.
Asked why such

great crowds always attend his
addresses while the churches of all de-
nominations are complaining of slim
attendance, Pastor Russell replied.
"The people are thinking. Perplexed
by the infidelity and Higher Criticism
taught in the principal colleges and
pulpits, many desire to have an inter-
pretation of the Bible consistent with
itself and not at war with the reverent
exercise of reason. The Scriptures
foretell our day, saying, 'There shall
be a famine in the land; not a famine
for bread nor a thirst for water, but
for the hearing of the Word of the
Lord' (Amos viii, 11). No fairy tales
can thoroughly satisfy intelligent
thinkers, whose numbers are increas-
ing.

Two services were held—one for the
public, considering the great "Here-
after;" the other, which we report,
had for its text God's call to Cain
after he had slain his brother, and
Cain's reply, "Where is thy brother?"
—"Am I my brother's keeper?" (Gen-
esis iv, 9). The speaker said in part:
"No one can dispute that individual-
ism, personal independence, personal
responsibility has done much for the
development of our race. The serf-
dom and paternalism of the past were
unfavorable to individual thought,
responsibility and action. No wise and
good man would desire to rob his fel-
lows of independence of mind.

"Where is Thy Brother?"
God's inquiry of Cain implied his re-
sponsibility, and teaches us a lesson
respecting our responsibility in God's
sight for one another. We will begin
with the church, the highest type of
brotherhood imaginable: We should
not be content to split into sects and
parties. Whatever was the ignorance
of the past which led to the formation
of the various creeds and denomina-
tions, there can be no excuse for these
now, because Christians of all denom-
inations have come to discredit the old
creeds.

Every true Christian should realize
that today Christianity is being as-
saulted in its own house and by its
professed friends. In the colleges and
seminaries of all denominations a bat-
tle is raging which threatens the de-
struction of our Christian faith. Pos-
sibly a few are blind to the situation,
but the insurgents—the Higher Critics
and Evolutionists—realize the situa-
tion and are craftily saying to the peo-
ple, "We are the watchmen upon the
walls of Zion; hearken to our cry; all
is well!" These Higher Critics seem
to have no conscience. They claim
that the people must be gradually taken
by guile. They encourage them to
sleep while they raise over them the
banner of infidelity called Higher Criticism.

Many who see the killing of this anti-
typical Abel shirk the responsibility
by saying, "Am I my brother's keeper?"
not realizing that from the Divine
standpoint they have a responsibility
toward every other Christian with
whom they are in contact. They
should realize that loyalty to God
means that they should "show forth
the praises of Him who hath called us
out of darkness into His marvelous
light." In a word, every true
Christian, who has made a full con-
secration of himself to the Lord to
walk in the footsteps of the Savior,
should waken to the fact that we are
in a critical time.

We may be sure that the Cain class
of our day will be held accountable for
the wilful slaying of their brother, es-
pecially to the extent that the brother
despised may be a child of God. As
God declared that the blood of
Abel cried to Him from the ground—
cried for justice—so the intimation of
the Scriptures is that all injustice of
every kind, everywhere, will bring a
"just recompense of reward."

"The Desire of All Nations Shall
Come."

Most explicitly do the Scriptures de-
clare that "The desire of all nations
shall come" (Haggai ii, 7). This de-
claration is in conjunction with the fore-
telling of the establishment of Mes-
siah's Kingdom. The reign of righteous-
ness which it will inaugurate will be
the ideal of the masses of mankind, al-
though quite probably the overthrow
of trusts and combines will for a time,
not be viewed sympathetically by some.
The thousand years of Messiah's
reign during which His Bride, the
Elect Church, will be associated with
Him, will be quite sufficient for the
equalization of all of life's affairs for
the entire race. In His day the right-
eous shall flourish. In His day evil-
doers and not the well-doers will be
crushed.

JOHN JACOB ASTOR IS A
GOOD ROADS ENTHUSIAST.

Goes to France to Learn Construction
and Maintenance of Highways.

Colonel John Jacob Astor, the mil-
lionaire, has joined the ranks of good
roads enthusiasts, and sooner or later
he will be heard from as exerting him-
self for the betterment of the public
highways.

Colonel Astor has gone to Paris. On
leaving New York he said: "One of

the chief purposes of my trip is to ob-
tain copies from the French govern-
ment of specifications for the con-
struction and maintenance of high-
ways. French methods of road build-
ing are excellent, as I have found by
personal study."

PROGRESS AND PROSPERITY

"The good roads movement is
not confined to any one state,"
says Clarence H. Bissell, presi-
dent of the New Jersey Auto-
mobile and Motor club, "and it is
to the credit of the people that
they are awaking to the abso-
lute necessity of good roads in
order to assure progress and
prosperity."

FOR THE GOOD ROADS CAUSE

Present Day Difficulties of Travelers
Shown in Pictures.

One of the most interesting methods
for advancing the cause of good roads
throughout the south is being under-
taken by the Southern Railway com-
pany, working in conjunction with the
United States office of public roads.

The company has started a special
"road improvement train," provided
with lantern slides and stereopticon
and screen. This train is touring the
south, stopping at all the large cities
and most of the small ones.

The stereopticon equipment is for
the purpose of showing all the ad-
vantages of good roads and the dis-
advantages of bad ones. Pictures
showing doctors caught in the ruts of
bad roads while on their way to pa-
tients, undertakers' wagons delayed
on the way to the cemeteries, auto-
mobils thrown on the road by a
bowlder in a bad road and two loads
of cotton, one from a bad road terri-
tory and the other from a good road
territory, the difference in weight
showing the profits and losses that
come from good and bad roads, are
being shown.

It is hoped by the backers of the
present movement that the road im-
provement train will stimulate the in-
terest of the south, bring about the
enactment of uniform laws and uni-
form methods in the handling of the
improvement and maintenance of
roads and give the whole south an
opportunity to realize the full economic
value of a complete system of im-
proved highways.

WHY?

It is nothing short of remark-
able how a long suffering and tax
paying people put up with the
incompetency and negligence of
their public servants. The little
brood of politicians who pre-
tend to manage such grave inter-
ests as road improvement should
be utterly discarded, and men of
engineering skill, sound wisdom
and approved merit should be
speedily substituted.

wretched feelings.

SOUR CREAM AND ITS USES.

There are many cooks who will not
take the trouble to save small quan-
tities of sour cream. It is really a val-
uable article of food and may be used
in numberless ways in food combina-
tions, saving butter, sweet cream and
other shortening.

Sour cream makes a good salad
dressing, a filling for pie together with
raisins and eggs. Gingerbreads, cook-
ies of all kinds and fried cakes are al-
ways to be depended upon for keep-
ing qualities when sour cream is used
in their composition. Here are a few
ways of using sour cream in cakes:

Nut Cake.—Take three-fourths of a
cup of sour cream, one cupful of sugar
one and a half cupfuls of flour, one
cup of chopped English walnut meats,
one egg, one-half teaspoonful each of
salt and soda; flavor to taste. Bake
in a loaf nearly an hour in a moderate
oven.

Feather Cake.—Take a cup of thick
sour cream, one cupful of sugar, two
cupfuls of flour sifted with a teaspoon-
ful of soda and one of baking powder,
a half teaspoon of salt, one egg, a tea-
spoonful of vanilla. Bake in a loaf.

Spice Cake.—To three-fourths of a
cup of sour milk add the same amount
of sugar, one and a half cupfuls of
flour, two tablespoonfuls of corn-
starch, a teaspoonful each of baking
powder, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg,
sifted with flour, and a half teaspoon
of salt and soda, one whole egg and
the yolks of two. Bake in layers and
put together with boiled frosting.

Cream Cakes.—Use the above recipe
and bake the cakes. In gem tins,
sprinkling over each a little granulated
sugar and putting a raisin in the cen-
ter before baking.

CHILD'S DRESS.



Nothing could be more simple than
this little frock and it has one great
advantage for warm weather in that
a number of them may be made in a
day and the child thus have always a
change at hand. Little material and
no labor of any account is involved in
the making. The small sleeve is cut
in one with the body of the dress. The
yoke is cut in square outline, which is
trimmed with insertion and this also
marks the edge of the closing on the
left hand side in front. There is very
little fullness in the dress, and a belt
of the material or of leather may hold
this in place.

The pattern (5440) is cut in sizes
2 to 8 years. Medium size requires
2 1/4 yards of 35 inch material, with 3/4
yards of insertion.
