BRITISH STEAM VESSELS WERE SENT TO BOTTOM

The German Submarines are Again Active Near Briton Isle, and Torpedo Couple of Steamships on Favorite "Hunting" Territory.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS Glasgow, Scotland, March 19.—(Via London.)—The British steamer Hyndford was torpedoed today in the English channel by a German submarine.

The steamer was torpedoed in the favorite hunting ground of the German submarines off Beachy Head while she was proceeding for London under her own steam.

STEAMER BLUEJACKET AND CARGO ARE LOST

London, March 19.—The British steamer Bluejacket with wheat from Liverpool has been torpedoed by a German submarine off Beachy Head.

The crew took to the boats. The steamer, although badly damaged, remained afloat. The Hyndford was of 2,775 tons net burden. She was 376 feet long and was built at Port Glasgow in 1905.

Conditions Which Austria Demands Are Inacceptable

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS Rome, Via Paris, March 19.—What reports to be an outline of Austria's attitude with relation to the cession of territory to Italy is contained in a dispatch to the Tribuna dated Vienna and telegraphed from the frontier.

The statement is made that Austria, without reflecting upon Italian good faith, contends it is only natural that the dual monarchy, if she is ready to grant territorial compensation, should wish to insure Italian neutrality.

Commenting upon this report, the Tribuna says the conditions which Austria demands are absolutely inacceptable. "The Austro-German point of view," the Tribuna says, "is wrong because they think Italy is asking compensation for neutrality. The problem is totally different. Austria provoked the war through aggression against Serbia, partly against repeated Italian warning and partly without Italy's knowledge."

THAW TO REMAIN OUT OF ASYLUM ANOTHER MONTH

Various Writs and Orders Sworn Out in His Behalf, and Resultant Legal Tangle Will Keep Him Out of Matteawan for Some Time

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS New York, March 19.—As the result of various writs and orders sworn out in his behalf and the resultant legal tangle, Harry Kendall Thaw is in no danger of being returned to the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan for at least a month.

Supreme court Justice Bijur, signer of the two writs of habeas corpus in Thaw's behalf said today after a conference with counsel for Thaw, the warder of the Tombs prison and representatives of the state attorney general's office, that Thaw's attorney could, by means of securing adjournments, delay the final hearing upon the first writ secured early in the week, until April 19.

Justice Bijur late last night signed a second writ of habeas corpus bringing up the issue that Thaw's commitment to Matteawan is illegal. The first writ was designed to bring a test of Thaw's sanity.

Both writs were returned to Justice Bijur today. Hearing on the first he adjourned until later today. The second was referred to Justice Alfred Page, before whom the trial of Thaw was recently conducted. This writ, it was admitted, was simply a technical move. As Justice Page had already ordered the return of Thaw to Matteawan, he was expected to promptly dismiss the second writ. Then the order of Justice Ingraham, requiring that Thaw be kept in the Tombs until argument was heard upon the appeal from Justice Page's decision, was to be served.

ITALIAN OFFICERS OF NOTE ARE CONVICTED

Rome, Via Paris, March 19.—Prof. Menozzi, convicted in November of selling to a French agent secret plans for mobilization of the Italian army, has been sentenced to seven years and six months in prison and a fine of \$2,000.

IMPORTANT OPERATIONS BY ALLIED FLEET OF SHIPS

Constantinople, March 17.—(Via Berlin and London.)—Only unimportant operations have been undertaken by the allied fleet operating against the Dardanelles for the past few days. The activity of the warships has been limited to demonstrations.

Two new attempts by cruisers and destroyers to approach the outer fortifications and clear the channel of mines are reported to have been futile because of the effective fire from the defenders.
