J. E. ALEXANDER PLEADED GUILTY

MAN WHO IS ALLEGED TO HAVE CONDUCTED MORTGAGE NEGOTIATIONS UNDER SEVERAL NAMES, IS ARRAIGNED IN FEDERAL COURT.

In the United States court yesterday J. E. Alexander, of near Molino, who was arrested recently for sending mail through the mails for the purpose of defrauding, entered a plea to one of the charges against him, but sentence was deferred until Monday.

Alexander is the man whom government officials alleged conducted negotiations through the mails with C. C. Goodman under several names, and almost succeeded in placing a mortgage upon the property of another man residing in this county.

John Merrill was sentenced to 90 days in the Holmes county jail for illicit distilling.

Theodore Brown was sentenced to three months in the Escambia county jail for larceny on the namba reservation.

Carleton Hightower, a rural mail carrier, who pleaded guilty to embezzlement, was sentenced to two years in the reform school.

Will Reddick and Will Owen, who had been sentenced to jail terms for cutting timber from a forest reserve, were allowed a fine of \$50 in lieu of their former sentences.

SAYS MR. RANSLEY IS VERY INCONSISTENT

Editor Pensacola Journal.
I see in your paper of May 10th an article from Arthur T. Ransley of Klondyke, Fla., claiming he has examined the writings of Pastor Russell and finds them a mass of error.

Mr. Ransley says: "Ignorance of the wonderful language in which the Scriptures of the New Testament was written is a crime. It is a misfortune." (Italics ours). We breathe a sigh of relief. It is quite evident that the great majority of work-a-day people know not Greek. Also unfortunate ours; but not Criminals Mr. Ransley graciously tells us.

Mr. Ransley who very evidently would have us understand that he "knows Greek" claims to have examined Pastor Russell's works carefully and proceeds to sit in judgment of the Great Writer and World famous preacher. "A heterogeneous mass of error remarkable for inconsistency" is the conclusion from his investigation.

Mr. Ransley failed to show either error or inconsistency in the few short extracts he gave. Where argument fails him, however, he fills in with "harsh words." These have ever been the mistakes of error, prejudice and ignorance.

Yes, one may even "know Greek" and still be ignorant of its true meaning and purpose of the Divine Revelation and his judgment may be so warped by prejudice and preconceived opinions as to render it worthless in regard to consistency and truth and certain presentations. "O consistency thou art indeed a jewel," but how rare!

Others perhaps as learned and as critical as many being "Readers of the Greek New Testament" have marveled at the beautiful harmony of Pastor Russell's interpretations of the Scriptures.

Mr. Ransley fails to be consistent in his newspaper attack. He denounces Pastor Russell as one "who does not know Greek" or "Cleverly conceals his knowledge." Again referring to Pastor Russell he says: "But to know it (the Greek language) and all the while conceal its true meaning . . . is a crime." Thus our friend Ransley denounces Pastor Russell as an ignorant "who displays his ignorance of Greek" and the next moment he brands him a criminal who knows it "but all the while conceals its true meaning!"

With the wonderful helps that are within reach of even the poor of this time, including the Diaglott a word for word literal translation of the New Testament, concordances, Bible Studies and helps, any one of moderate intelligence and unprejudiced mind may become a Bible student and "thoroughly furnished" as a "man of God" without even rudimentary knowledge of the Greek language.

Pastor Russell is doing an invaluable work through his books and sermons stimulating Bible study all along the line.

The examination of what he teaches about the nature of Christ by Mr. Ransley has not changed the facts. Read the Evening News, May 9th issue, and you will see the pastor's sermon presenting some more Scripture citations that likely Mr. Ransley ob-

Sidney, N. S. 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CUSTOMS TAX ON CONTAINERS.
Washington, May 13.—The proper customs tax on containers of glycerine today afforded the basis for the first case to come before the supreme court of the United States from the new court of customs appeals. Importers ask the court to review the decree of the customs court adverse to them. The controversy is whether the pro-

vision of the Payne-Aldrich tariff act, applying to "cylindrical, or tubular tanks or vessels for holding gas, liquids or other material, whether full or not," include the usual containers of merchandise.

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HOUSE MEMBERS SPEND SUNDAY AT THEIR HOMES

Washington, May 13.—The house having adjourned yesterday until Tuesday, many members took advantage of the opportunity to go to their homes. The senate having adjourned until Monday, there was very little legislative activity at the capital.

There will be a fight on the statehood bill when it is called up Tuesday and Representative Flood, chairman of the committee on territories, expects the debate to continue for three or four days.

EDUCATE SOUTH AMERICANS.
Washington, May 13.—To educate South Americans in the aims and spirit of American diplomacy, William F. Cresson, charge d'affaires of the United States legation at Lima, Peru, advocates in a dispatch to the state department the issuance of a South American supplement by some metropolitan newspaper in this country. He bases his view on the fact that a similar supplement published some time ago by an English paper met with great success in Peru and that the South American governments generally furthered its distribution. The Peruvian government, under an agreement extending until 1915, he adds, subscribes to 4,000 copies of an English monthly published in Peru by an American journalist.
